It was stated that one pair of aphids could produce the number 156 followed by 22 zeros during the season. Secretary Lois Boenig reported on "Project Ladybug." The Boenig trees were infested with aphids to a point where it wasn't safe to walk under them because of the drip. Mrs. Boenig turned loose a quart of ladybugs. She stated that within a week the aphids had disappeared and so had the black mites which were infesting other plants. The ladybugs had been purchased for \$5 from a Northern California firm.

For the Lecturer's program, Marguerite Moss asked each member to offer suggestions for things to do in the coming year for fun or education. Among the suggestions were: a cake walk, balloon race, skills, speakers from other organizations, musical programs, funny story night, a style show and home movies.
