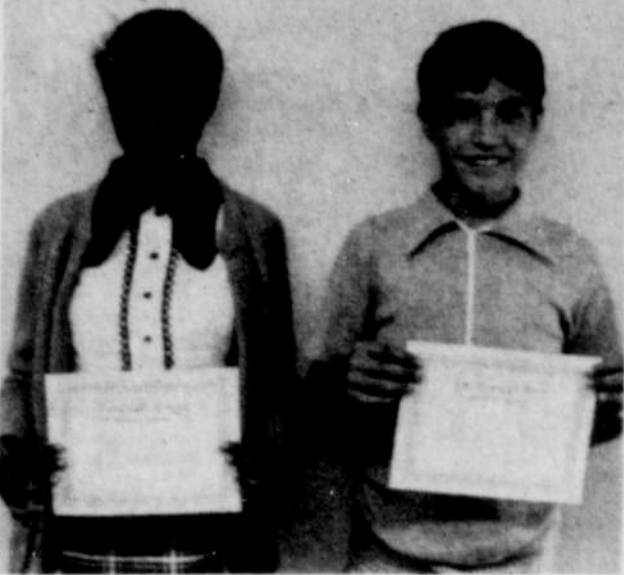

Post Office Offers Stamp Purchase By Mail

With the Christmas mailing rush drawing near, Postmaster Dail today reminded customers that they may purchase their postage stamps by mail.

Earlier Christmas mailing is anticipated through use of the U.S. Postal Service's by Mail program, Mr. Dail said.

Last year saw a sharp increase in orders for the category of 100 eight cent stamps, one of the five assortments offered, during the pre-Christmas period.

Stamps by Mail order forms, which include self-addressed return envelopes are available from the post office.

Customers pay no postage to send their stamp orders or to receive the stamps. A small service charge covers the cost of the two-way postage and guarantees the customer against loss in transit.

Dr. Espeland will discuss the disease of diabetes and the importance of controlled diets at the special interest meeting. Also on the program will be Mrs. Evelyn Johnson, Caldwell. Mrs. Johnson is Dietitian at Holy Rosary Hospital in Ontario and will discuss menu planning for the diabetic.

Helen Conner, Oregon State University Extension Home Economist, will suggest points to consider when shopping for food for the diabetic diet.

Navy Recruiting Officer To Visit Malheur County

Navy Commander Robert C. Woods will make a scheduled visit to Ontario on Thursday of this week during a familiarization tour of all Oregon and southern Idaho Navy recruiting offices. With headquarters located in Portland, Commander Woods recently assumed the duties as the Commanding Officer of the Portland Navy Recruiting District and almost simultaneously with the acceptance of the duties of his new command came word that he had been selected for promotion to Captain in the U. S. Navy. With his new command and promotional prospects Commander Woods now steams towards a most challenging goal. That of leadership and management of a Navy recruiting district with Navy recruiters who face the task of helping to build a volunteer military force by enlisting outstanding qualified young men and women.

While in Ontario Commander Woods will meet and confer with local area Navy recruiters, Chief Petty Officer Max Chavez and Petty Officer Terry Hart who man the Ontario Navy Recruiting Office. Commander Woods will also observe the building progress of the new Armed Forces Recruiting Station, now nearing completion

and located in the 1100 block on SW 4th Avenue.

A graduate of the Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland, Commander Woods was commissioned as a Naval Officer in 1953. His tours of duty include six naval ships of the line with five of which were destroyers. His assignments climaxed when he took over as the Commanding Officer of the Destroyer USS Charles Berry (DE1064). Commander Woods also commanded the USS Lockwood, a destroyer that he placed in commission in December of 1970. Following departure from Lockwood Commander Woods spent a tour of duty under instruction prior to receiving orders to his present command.

Dairy Commission In Ontario Oct. 26

The regular business meeting of the Oregon Dairy Products Commission will be held at the Tapadera Motor Inn in Ontario this Friday, October 26, according to "Scotty" Payne, Vale dairyman who serves as chairman of the commission.

The meeting will start at 10 a.m. and interested dairymen are invited to attend, Payne said.

Seedling Inspection

Oregon seed growers who planted alfalfa or red clover for certification this fall are reminded that a seedling inspection request should be made within 60 days of planting according to Malheur County Extension Agent Leeds Bailey. The seedling inspection is required to qualify subsequent seed crops for certification. Bailey says the seedling inspections are made to examine the fields for volunteer plants, noxious weeds and isolation from uncultivated fields.

Certification regulations and applications forms are available at the County Extension Office in Ontario.

Equitable Savings today reported nine months net earnings of \$3,443,422, a 29% increase over earnings of \$2,672,472 for the same period last year, according to William E.
