Local College Student Park Manager For Summer

Idaho State University's program in park and recreation management broke important new ground this year by having senior students accepted as paid managers of a state park without direct supervision while undertaking their practicum.

It is the first time that a state park in the country has been totally managed by college students without on-site supervision, according to Dr. Robert Gregory, associate professor in charge of ISU's park and recreation management program, and Steven W. Bly, Boise, director of Idaho State Parks and Recreation Department.

Gregory and officials of the state parks department provided general supervision of the students.

"The experience proved a very successful and effective means of guiding students into a paying-job practicum with tremendous learning dynamics," Gregory said.

Bly says the program was "tremendously successful," not only for the students but for the park itself.

"Not only did they just maintain and operate the park, they also used their creativity and imagination," Bly said. He said the success of the venture has brought many inquiries from other state government and municipal park authorities and universities interested in setting up similar programs.

Roy Evans, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil R. Evans of Nu Acres and a graduate of Fruitland High School, and Dale L.

Duncan of Buhl, Idaho shared managerial responsibilities at Indian Rocks State Park, 22 miles from Pocatello, from the park's spring opening until its close in the fall. Each managed the park for half the season. Both are seniors scheduled to graduate in December.

The students were responsible for many and varied activities: they prepared the park for opening, installed and maintained facilities, catered for camping and picnic requirements, collected fees, prepared an informative slide show and displays for visitors, kept financial and other records, including a traffic count on the origin of visitors and types of vehicles they used, drew up a park budget for the following season, prepared regular reports for park administrators and their academic supervisor and the annual report to the Idaho Parks and Recreation Department, and even gained much experience in plumbing and coping with grasshoppers.

Among the innovations the students introduced to the park was a nature trail they constructed through sagebrush and lava beds. With the help of a member of the ISU Department of Biology, they prepared descriptive material about the wildlife to be seen along the trail. Now, in cooperation with ISU journalism majors, they are preparing a brochure about the trail and about the park facilities in general. If approved by the park administration, the brochures will be ready for next year's visitors.

Winter Road Reports Will Be Issued Daily

The winter road and weather report issued daily by the Highway Division throughout the winter season will begin on November 1, it was announced today by F. B. Klaboe, administrator of highways and state highway engineer.

The reports will be gathered five times daily, Monday through Friday, and three times daily on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. The Highway Division will initiate a teletype report at 8:15 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. on weekdays. In addition to these reports, the State Police will gather road and weather information at approximately 5:15 a.m., 1:45 p.m., and 9:15 p.m., seven days a week.

These reports are transmitted to the Oregon State Police, local law enforcement agencies,

U.S. Weather Bureau, American Automobile Association Headquarters in Portland, and news media wire services.

State Police will gather information from their patrols and from Highway Division section crews which will include the following mountain summit stations: Sunset Summit, Wilson River Summit, Government Camp, Santiam Pass, Willamette Pass, Green Springs, Siskiyou Summit, Meacham, Tollgate, and Ladd Canyon. In addition reports will be received from many other stations scattered about the state.

During normal working hours, road condition reports may be obtained from the Highway Division's Maintenance Section by dialing 378-6532.

Speaking To The Consumer

HOW YOU SAVE. Savings accounts have been steadily increasing in popularity as an outlet for savings by families. Savings accounts, however, differ considerably in the return they pay. You, as a saver, are concerned with getting the greatest possible return on your savings accounts.

Three factors are important in determining this return—the interest rate paid, the frequency of compounding interest (quarterly or daily), and the bookkeeping method used to determine the portion of the funds in the savings account eligible to earn interest.

If you are choosing a savings institution, ask about these three factors—they make a difference in how fast your savings grow.

BE AN INFORMED CONSUMER. If you are thinking of buying a new automobile and are concerned about the gasoline mileage you can expect to get, there's a free fact sheet to help you. EQUALITY FOR WOMEN. Have you been discriminated against in purchasing goods, services, or lodging because you're a woman?
