10 YEARS AGO

A new attorney for the city of Nyssa, but a well-known figure in Malheur County, was revealed this week. The private law practice of E. Otis Smith, former district attorney of Malheur County, will be resumed this coming week in the sugar community at 20 North Third Street.

In commenting on entering the field of law in Nyssa, Smith said he had confidence in this stable community and has a wide acquaintance in the area which induced him to remain in Malheur County, his home since 1929.

So far as the labor situation is concerned, a large group of Mexicans are available at Hood River for work in Malheur County if transportation can be secured.

The war food administration furnished a bus to bring 33 Mexicans to Nyssa Wednesday night and the sugar company sent a bus to Hood River for 27 more.

Apparently transportation cannot be secured for the laborers on the railroad so the sugar company expects to bring as many of them to Nyssa as possible by bus.
