BLM Facts Booklet Out

Revenue from land administered by the Bureau of Land Management in Oregon and Washington during fiscal year 1973 was \$104 million. This is an increase of \$22 million over last fiscal year. During the year, BLM in Oregon sold 1,236,098,000 board feet of timber for \$130,295,820; planted trees on 21,364 acres; thinned 10,592 acres of timber; leased 13,080,715 acres for grazing by 326,904 head of livestock for \$721,613 in grazing fees; operated 73 recreation sites; built 313 miles of roads, and granted mineral leases on 385,932 acres. Timber sales revenue sharing with western Oregon's 18 OAC counties was a record \$47 million. These are just a few of the statistics contained in a 22-page booklet BLM FACTS, published by the Oregon State Office of the Bureau of Land Management. BLM State Director Archie D. Craft said, "The publication of BLM FACTS is one way in which the Bureau of Land Management informs the public about management of resources on 16 million acres of BLM land in Oregon and Washington." 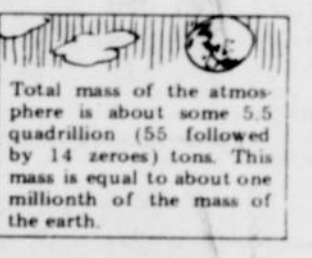
NEWS FROM BIG BEND

Spokane Expo '74 In Heart of Recreation Area

SPOKANE---The Expo '74 World's Fair will be held in an ideal spot for families that like camping.
