LESLIE FUJISHIN STUDIES AT MAYO

Leslie Fujishin of Adrian, Oregon, is among 40 students who have begun a two-year physical therapy program at the Mayo School of Health-Related Sciences. Miss Fujishin is a graduate of Lewis and Clark College, Portland. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sami Fujishin of Route 1, Homedale, Idaho.

The Mayo School of Health-Related Sciences is a part of the Division of Education of the Mayo Foundation.

The new physical therapy class consists of students from 15 states who represent 24 colleges and universities. The class includes 23 women and 17 men.

The forty students were selected from 630 applicants.

According to Gordon K. Branes, program director at the Mayo School of Health-Related Sciences, Program in Physical Therapy, the first ten months of the course will involve intensive academic instruction, while the final 14 months will concentrate on clinical education at six different facilities in the Rochester, Minnesota area.

Before graduating from the Mayo program, the students must complete and pass licensing examinations offered by the Minnesota State Board of Medical Examiners.

Upon completion of the course, students are eligible for licensure as registered physical therapist throughout the United States.

The new class includes students who have completed three years of pre-professional work at an accredited college or university, as well as several college or university graduates. The three-year students will receive the bachelor's degree from their home college or university after completing the two-year physical therapy course, Branes said.
