The label illustrates new uniform method of identification, showing first, the species of meat (Beef); second, the primal area--or so-called wholesale cut--from which the retail cut was derived (Rib); and finally, the recommended retail name (Eye Steak).

Thus, the cut will be labeled as a Beef Rib Eye Steak wherever it is sold rather than a Delmonico steak in one place, a Boneless Rib Eye steak some place else, or a Fillet, Spencer or Beauty steak in still other stores across the nation, or even across the street.

**Herb's Views**

Is it possible that we may be protecting ourselves to death? The Food and Drug Administration has so many rules, tests and regulations that it's almost impossible to introduce a new drug into the market in the United States. It came to me as somewhat of a shock the other day when I learned that three out of four drugs synthesized by American industry can save lives and relieve suffering only outside of the boundaries of the United States.

This all happened several years ago when we had the Thalidomide scare. To prevent anything like it happening again laws were created which made it almost impossible for any new drug to be placed on the market. Any medicine is dangerous if not used properly. In fact people die every year from an over dose of aspirin and all the laws in the world won't make drugs absolutely safe to use. We have a "benefit to risk" factor. In other words, will this particular drug be of help in far more cases than it will do harm? Any drug that doesn't alter the functions of the body in some manner isn't worth very much.

If a pharmaceutical plant discovered a drug that would positively cure cancer 99 times out of a hundred times and that one time out of a hundred would probably kill the patient they would not dare place the drug on the market. In the first place the FDA probably would not pass the drug as O.K. If the drug did pass federal standards, they couldn't sell enough to pay for the lawsuits arising from that one patient that was killed. Remedies today must be 100% certain, or else.

I had a terrible time getting a small pox shot this year. I was informed that several people, I believe it was eight, died in 1972 from the shot itself, so it was decided that small pox vaccine was no longer safe. It was not recommended. I shudder to think what may happen in about ten years if children are no longer vaccinated and an epidemic is started. The population explosion will be taken care of.
