(Continued From Page 1) "Though we don't anticipate a shortage in our area," he said, "Idaho Power has been urging 'wise use' of electricity for some time and therefore suggests that our customers follow the same rule with Christmas lighting after weighing the facts."

McBroom said Idaho Power calculations indicate that "out of the nearly 10 billion kilowatt-hours of electricity used in our area last year," only three-hundredths of one percent was used for Christmas lighting.

Interior Christmas lighting "does not necessarily increase the use of electricity," the manager noted.

As a case in point, he said, when interior Christmas lighting is turned on, other lighting is usually turned off to gain the full effect—thus very likely saving on energy.

"And since one kilowatt-hour of lighting provides an equal

## Your County Agent Says

Liquid feeds are rapidly becoming popular in the county. --These liquid feeds are actually liquid feed supplements.

Basically the feed is molasses fortified with urea or some other protein source, a mineral, usually phosphorus—sometimes water is added to these liquid feeds as a diluent or carrier for phosphorus, urea, or other supplements. It is important to know the percentage of water in these liquid feeds to determine actual feed value.

These liquid supplements are used in several ways; in feed processing, as a top dressing or feed free choice in lick tanks. In the cattle case care should be taken to prevent over consumption of the urea fortified supplement to prevent toxicity.

As with all supplements one should be sure of the analysis of the material and use it only as needed to supplement the feed being used.

Liquid feed supplements do have a place and have several advantages if used properly.

## IMPROVE ALFALFA HAY QUALITY WITH WEED CONTROL

Now is the time to apply chemicals to alfalfa hay fields to control broad leaf and grassy weeds that can greatly lower the quality of next year's hay crop. Such weeds as mustards, shepherds purse, Chinese lettuce and cheat grass lower the protein content of hay. The weeds mature ahead of the alfalfa and are much lower in protein. As a result the forage is less desirable for feeding and brings less money in the market place. This is especially true of the first cutting.

A couple of soil sterilants are available for fall application to the hay crop. These are Simazine and Karmex. Both have federal registration and have shown outstanding weed control characteristics in tests conducted at the Malheur Experiment Station and other areas.

Simazine or Karmex should be applied as soon as possible after the alfalfa has gone dormant. This usually occurs around the middle of November. Be sure and read the label on the chemicals thoroughly in order to avoid residue problems. The weedicides are soil sterilants and can damage the alfalfa or following crops if not handled properly.

## SALT POLLUTION: WHO WORRIES

about "salt" or "chemicals" being used to keep our roads and highways safe for driving --fact is "who worries" about salt pollution?

An American City Magazine poll on salting practices in 116 cities turned up some interesting facts.

For each inch of snowfall sample cities used 160 tons of deicing agents. For each lane mile treated 13.4 tons were used per winter. Where heavy snowfall took place 20.6 tons per lane mile was used.

Well, winter--snow is here and deicing will take place to save lives and add safety to highway travel.

Scientists are working on what effect salting has on vegetation, water supplies, etc.

## Favorite Food

I surely tasted some good "cookin'" in Wisconsin last week while visiting with relatives. Sauk City is a village located between rolling hills in Central Wisconsin. Cookin' has become an art there where recipes are passed down from mother to daughter for several generations. My aunt served a delicious "Apple Torte," I like it because it is nice and moist. (The apples do this. She mentioned how long it took to peel and chop the apples. A blender solves this chore. Simply core the apples and cut them into fourths. Fill the blender 3/4 full of water and drop in two apples. Turn it on medium speed and turn it off almost immediately. Then pour the apples and water into a strainer and presto—they're ready. This may take a little practice to get them "just right."

## APPLE TORTE

- 1/4 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 cup flour
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 2 cups chopped apples

Cream the butter, add sugar and beat until fluffy. Add egg and beat until blended. Sift flour with soda, salt, nutmeg, and cinnamon. Add to creamed mixture alternately with the apples. Pour into an 8"x8"x2" aluminum pan. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 30 to 35 minutes. Serves 9.

And then the following sauce makes it even better!!

- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 cup white sugar
- 3/4 tsp. vanilla.

Combine butter, sugar and cream, mix thoroughly and beat on medium heat, blend well. Add vanilla and serve warm over Apple Torte.

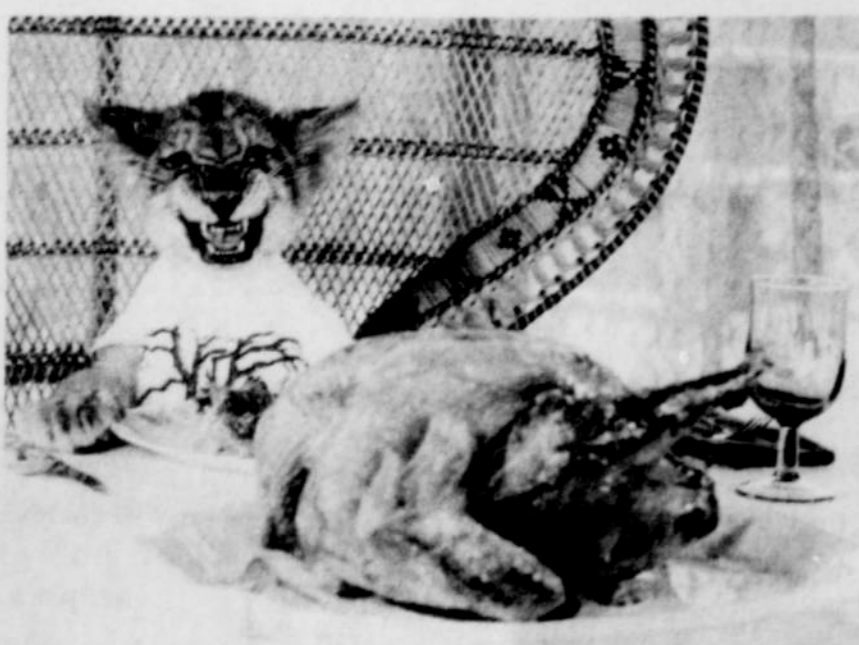
