

Kidney Association Launches Fund Drive

"Your Gift Means Life" is the theme for the fifth annual statewide fundraising drive just launched by the Kidney Association of Oregon to obtain \$200,000 in public donations. The money will be used during 1974 to continue the life-saving program for 40 KAO's patients throughout the state now on artificial kidney machines and to expand the program to add new patients.

The theme, "Your Gift Means Life," tells dramatically that donations to KAO by individuals and organizations actually provide the means for patients to continue a productive life. It also points out KAO's vital need for money to be able to admit new patients.

Chuck Foster, executive director of the Kidney Association, explained how people can put this into practice. He said, "It costs \$12 to provide one day of life for a KAO patient. When an individual sends us a \$12 check, he is giving one day of life. In addition," he pointed out, "thousands of people have sent us checks

equal to several days of life." Most people, faced with death because of kidney failure and the extremely high cost of care, depend on KAO to assist them financially. In the first few months of care, KAO provides patients with artificial kidney machines, training and medical supplies. Then, the Kidney Association continues its help on an on-going basis year after year, by providing medical supplies.

KAO's function is to raise funds for continuing patient treatment, allowing these people to work, raise their families and be useful, productive individuals.

Foster emphasized, "We have the medical know-how to save lives of kidney failure victims and rehabilitate them. There are enough kidney machines manufactured. The only shortage we have," he said, "is money!"

County Republicans Support President Nixon

A strong statement in support of President Nixon was made by the Malheur County Republican Central Committee. Joe Hobson, Chairman, stated that this is in response to general public interest and comment as well as committee members who were polled.

Hobson stated that individual letters from interested citizens are also being written the Oregon Congressional delegation in Congress.

As a result of opinion expressed in the area, the following resolution has been adopted.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Richard M. Nixon, having been twice elected President of the United States of America,

the second time by the greatest majority in the history of our country; and

WHEREAS, President Nixon is now under heavy pressure to resign under the pretense that his leadership no longer has the support of the American people; and

WHEREAS, the Malheur County Republican Central Committee under such circumstances deems it proper to take notice of the accomplishments of President Nixon and his administration, of which the following are strong evidence of the positive leadership qualities he possesses:

1. None of the Armed Forces of the United States are involved in war for the first time since President Eisenhower was our leader.

2. President Nixon, although continually criticized and hindered by some, has brought an end to the longest war in the history of the United States, with honor and without surrender as would have been the case had he succumbed to those who continually pressed for deadlines for the end of American involvement.

3. President Nixon has initiated a relationship with the USSR and Communist China, whereby communication and an exchange of ideas and trade make conflict with those countries less likely than has existed at any time since World War II.

4. The conflict in the Middle East has been confined to that

area without direct involvement of the major powers, which is a tribute to the negotiating skills of President Nixon.

5. Farm prices and rural prosperity are greater than at any time in the memory of most farmers.

6. Employment in the U. S. is at an all time high.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,

That the Republican Central Committee of Malheur County, Oregon, does hereby support President Nixon, urges him to disregard critics who are asking him to resign, and requests that he continue to utilize the skills he possesses to work unceasingly toward a true and lasting peace throughout the world.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that each Senator and Representative from the State of Oregon are hereby urged to speak out at every opportunity in support of our President and to exert his or her full energy and influence in support of President Nixon, and further, to oppose in every way any attempts to impeach him.
