Judo Tourney Draws Locals

The Ore-Ida Judo Club of Ontario participated in the first judo tournament of the season Saturday, November 24 at Salt Lake City, Utah.

Local members of the club who won trophies in the tournament are Eric Stunz, 2nd place in the 13-14 year old light-weight division; and Phillip Keeveren, 2nd place in the 11-12 year old middleweight division.

The junior team from Ore-Ida, made up of boys 12 and under, won the junior team championship over clubs from Denver, Salt Lake City, Hill Field, Ogden, and Boise Valley of Caldwell. The Ore-Ida Juniors defeated Ogden in the finals by a 50-0 score.

Hearing on Rules For Wildlife

At the stroke of midnight on New Year's Eve while most folks are bringing in the new year, the State Game Commission will quietly become the State Wildlife Commission.

The name change is part of a package passed by the 1973 Legislature which revises Oregon's wildlife code. House Bill 2010, which accomplished this, streamlines and modernizes the laws under which wildlife is managed in Oregon.

One feature of the new code is that some areas are left to administrative rule that were covered by statute under the current laws. The Wildlife Commission will adopt these new rules as well as others that are necessary to effectively manage wildlife as soon after January 1 as possible.

A public hearing is scheduled for 10 a.m. on Friday, December 14, at Game Commission headquarters, SW Alder and 17th in Portland, to give the public an opportunity to comment and present opinions on the rules.

A summary of the rules follows. Copies of any of the rules are available from the State Game Commission, P.O. Box 3503, Portland, Oregon 97208.

In covering a wide range of topics, the various rules:

Provide for disposal of wildlife seized or otherwise acquired by the Commission.

Set forth the requirements for a wildlife holding permit and cover the care and inspection of wildlife held in captivity.

Regulate the issuance of wildlife propagation licenses and the transportation, care, and inspection of wildlife raised for sale.

Prescribe the type of records to be maintained by fur dealers and provide for inspection of the records.

List conditions under which wildlife may be taken for scientific purposes and establish procedures for obtaining a permit to do so.

Provide for issuance of permits to buy or exchange for deer, elk, and antelope hides and specify the type of records to be maintained.

Declare the meat of cougar inedible and provide that the hide and skull of cougar may be removed and retained by the hunter.

Establish the times and conditions under which competitive dog trials may be held.

Authorize hunting from a motor-propelled vehicle by permanently disabled persons or to control wildlife damage.

Allow the use of artificial lights to hunt raccoon and opossum or to control wildlife damage.

Authorize permits for landowners to harass wildlife causing damage.

Provide for the protection of certain nongame wildlife.

Deal with appointment of license agents, procedures for issuance of hunting and fishing licenses, accounting procedures, revocation and suspension of license agents.

At the same hearing the Commission will consider amending an existing administrative rule to forbid killing seals in the Columbia River. This would put Oregon's laws in compliance with the National Marine Mammal Protection Act.

Several other rules will be repealed because they have become obsolete or are spelled out by statute.

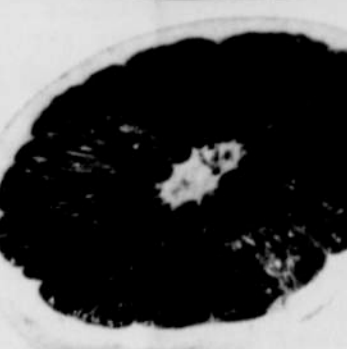
