Study on Solid Waste Practices Released

The Pacific Northwest Regional Commission released the results of a study on solid waste practices and alternatives in Malheur County, Oregon, and Payette, Gem, Washington, and Canyon Counties, in Idaho. The study determined the amounts of waste generated in each county and made several recommendations to the local governmental units.

Primary among recommendations was that the counties should work together in their handling of solid wastes. This regionalized concept would make the ultimate cost of disposal to the residents cheaper than if each county continues to pursue their individual action as in the past. The report suggests that one sanitary landfill, centrally located could handle all the waste from the study area. Fruitland was considered as the most centrally located.

The study was financed through the Northwest Regional Commission which is made up of the governors of Oregon, Idaho and Washington. Beside the local study area on the Oregon-Idaho border, an area on the Idaho-Washington border near Lewiston was also looked at. The purpose of the study was to consider the feasibility of several regionalized solid waste management alternatives. Included was a large recycling center where all wastes would be sorted and recycled. Another alternative involved a plant that would make compost of the waste. Considered, but not reported on in depth, was incineration of the waste.

This study by the government was not connected with the solid waste planning project now under way in Malheur County. The local project did provide some of the data used in the governors study where applicable.

Other recommendations in the report included door-to-door collection required for all city residents, terminating of individual haulers to a dump or landfill with uncovered loads, closure of all illegal dumps, the formation of a regional (inter-county) organization to handle all phases of solid waste management, a public informational program to alert residents of problems associated with solid waste, and the elimination of all open dumps and burning of garbage.
