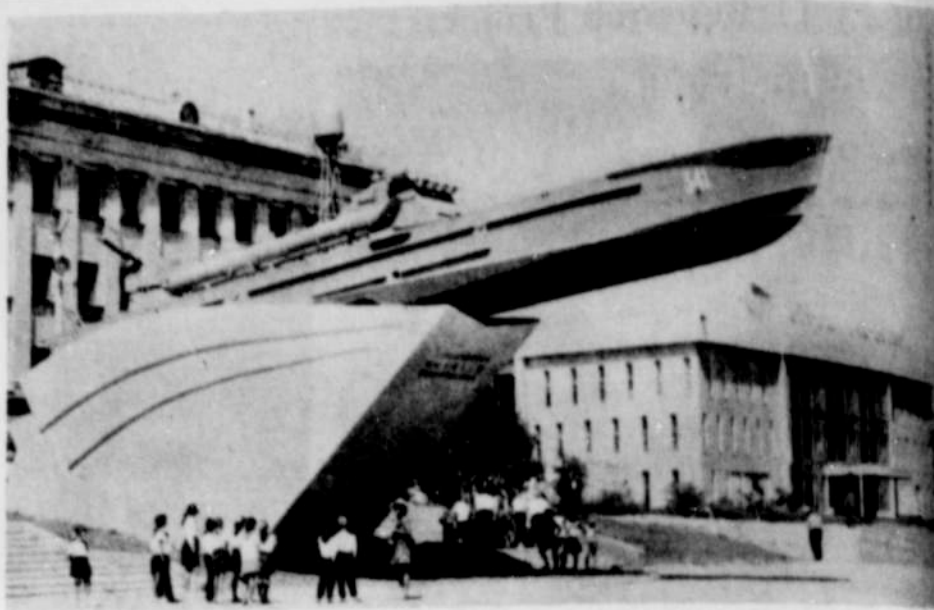

Industry Warns Against Mixing Snow Tires

If you are putting snow tires on a car equipped with radial tires, you should get radial snow tires, the Tire Industry Safety Council reminded motorists today.

"The driving characteristics of radial tires are so different it is actually dangerous to have radials on the front wheels and bias ply or bias-belted tires on the rear wheels," said Council Chairman Malcolm R. Lovell, Jr. "It might be compared to having a rubber-soled shoe on one foot and a leather soled shoe on the other."

In support of its warning, the Council cited a new public advisory from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration on snow tires.

"If your car is equipped with radial ply tires, it is essential that radial ply constructed snow treads be purchased," said the advisory.

"Many motorists consider radial tires to be equal in traction to snow tires in snow or icy conditions," the advisory added. "However, most states
