

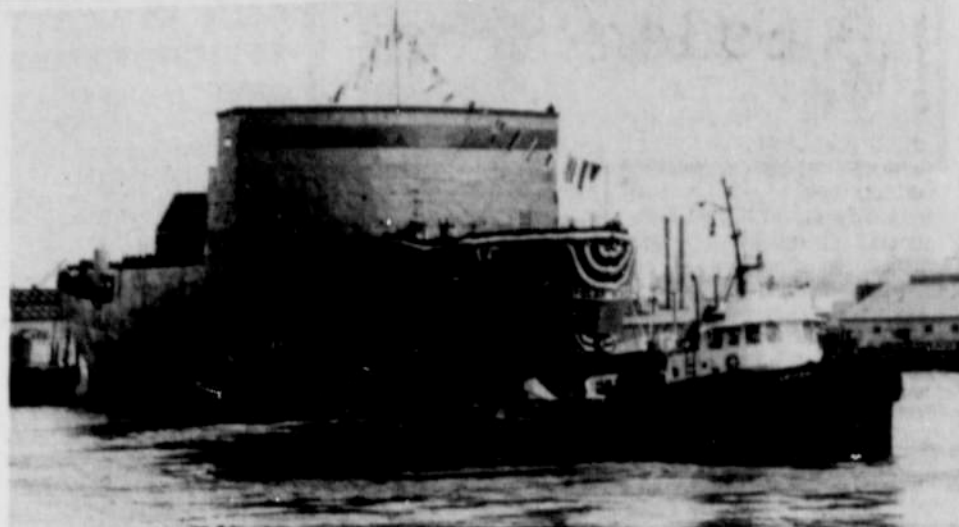

THE COAST GUARD'S NEWEST ICEBREAKER was launched and christened POLAR STAR November 17 at Lockheed Shipbuilding and Construction Company in Seattle. The 400-foot icebreaker, most powerful in the U.S. fleet and the first U.S. icebreaker to be built in 20 years, is scheduled to be delivered to the Coast Guard in about 12 months. Powered by a novel diesel-electric/gas turbine propulsion system, the Polar Star will be capable of cutting through ice six feet thick and of ramming her way through 21 feet of ice. The Coast Guard has not yet announced the homeport for the new ship.

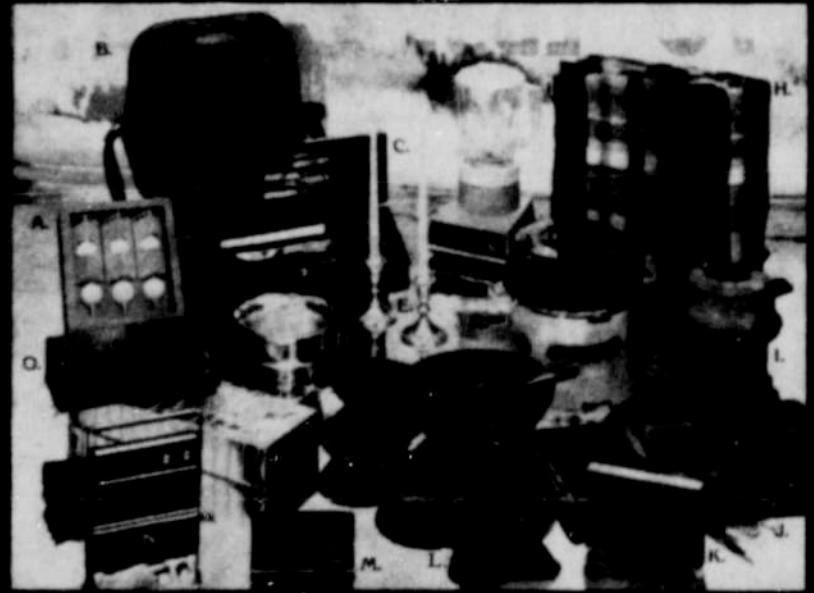
