THE X-RAY DEPARTMENT.
The function of the X-ray Department is to provide the best diagnostic assistance possible to the attending physician and the patient. The X-ray technician is available day and night, and his or her primary consideration is always the welfare of the patient. This is best served by obtaining the maximum amount of diagnostic information.

A single x-ray can sometimes tell several things. For instance, a single film of the chest for tuberculosis can also show the measurement of the heart, or air under the diaphragm, which could mean a perforated ulcer. A single film of the abdomen can show excess gas in the stomach, or a calculus in a ureter, or will sometimes even show gallstones.

When a child has had a head injury it is important to get several films, with the head positioned in at least five different ways, because the head is like an egg shell and can have a

fracture line anyplace.

Very frequently a patient has pain so great in one area that something else can be overlooked. The technician tries to get all the information possible in order to cover all the areas involved.

The Radiologist reads the film with infinite care and makes a report to the attending physician.

X-rays made in the hospital, and the reports thereon, are the property of the hospital. They are made available at the request of the patient to any physician who is caring for the patient, so that their use is for the best possible care of the patient.

The Malheur Memorial Hospital has the latest of radiology equipment, which includes a X-Omat which is the developing unit of the x-ray film. With this piece of equipment, film can be developed in 90 seconds. This can be very important in case of emergencies.

X-Ray technicians are on call 24 hours per day for the convenience of the community.

Your County Agent Says

EVALUATE YOUR LEAFCUTTER MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

One of the real production limitations facing alfalfa seed growers this coming crop season is a shortage of pollinators to set the seed crop. The problem is that only the leafcutter and alkali bees do an efficient job in pollinating enough alfalfa blooms to produce a good seed crop. Both will be in short supply this coming year.

The leafcutter bee population has been declining for several years due to a number of causes. These include losses to insecticide, losses due to cold or windy weather periods and an unknown factor that cause high larval mortality. Some farmers have used the same bee boards for a number of years and many of the holes are filled with cells that didn't hatch and are infested with such nest destroyers as carpet beetles, grain beetles and other parasites and predators that reduce the leafcutter population.

Alfalfa seed growers should evaluate their leafcutter management system and upgrade it wherever possible. It can pay big dividends when next year's seed crop is harvested.

CATTLE DEATHS - DUE TO SHIPPING FEVER

Potential supplies of carcass beef was reduced by 220,000,000 pounds, or enough to supply 1.9 million consumers with their 116 pound per year diet of beef. The death loss and medical treatment expenses cost livestock feeders \$95 million.

The American National Cattlemen's Association Animal Health Committee headed by Malheur's Bert Hawkins places shipping fever as the number one disease research problem.

TIME NOW TO ORGANIZE 4-H LIVESTOCK CLUBS

Now is the time of the year that 4-H Livestock Clubs are getting organized for the coming year. Every area of Malheur County has at least one club available for young people 9 to 19 years of age that are interested in livestock.

The main concern of these young stockmen at this time of the year is selecting and purchasing their projects. To show these projects

at the 1974 Malheur County Fair, August 14 - 17, market beef animals must be in the member's possession by March 1 and market hogs and lambs by May 15. All other animals must be in possession by June 1.

When selecting market project animals 4-H members need to keep in mind the weight requirements for animals going through the Junior Auction. These weights are beef 850 to 1200 pounds; sheep 80 to 125 pounds and swine 180 to 235 pounds. Animals not meeting these weights can be shown at the fair but not sold through auction.

Last year over 335 young people participated in livestock clubs and present interests indicates that the participation will increase this year. Anyone interested in joining a livestock club may either contact livestock leaders in their area or the Malheur County Extension office.

HERD MANAGEMENT CONTROL - LING CALF SCOURS

Welcome news to some cow calf operators last year was the announcement of a new effective scour vaccine developed specifically for certain virus caused scours in small calves. No vaccine as yet has been developed to combat many of the bacteria scours. Herd management is the best approach

to control this type of scours. The first step begins to get those calving cows onto clean ground. Ground with adequate drainage and room for the calving herd. Many of these scour bacteria are carried over in the soil so moving away from the source of infection can be one of the very effective means of controlling the disease.

Some operators have converted to fall calving to hold down scour losses. This is just one of the beneficial effects of fall calving according to research findings at Squaw Butte Experiment Station at Burns, Oregon.
