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Three In Finals of Nyssa Invitational

Nyssa High School settled for third place in the 8th annual Nyssa Invitational, after winning their own tourney for the past two years, but Coach Mel Calhoun called it "the best ever." Held last Friday and Saturday, over 230 wrestlers were involved in 338 matches on 3 mats in two almost continuous days of wrestling.

College Board Tests Given N.H.S. Seniors

Duane Buchtel, Guidance Counselor for the Nyssa Schools reports that he has received the college board ACT test results and they have been distributed to seniors who took the test October 20 at TVCC.

The ASVAB tests were given by the Armed Services on December 5. These aptitude tests were given to 43 interested seniors.

Last Friday, December 7, Arch Hubbard, Air Force Liaison Officer for the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado visited the Nyssa Junior High. He spoke with the 8th grade boys and showed them a movie "What Makes a Man?" During a question and answer period he discussed the academy, entrance requirements, etc.

The Guidance Office has also received the results of the PSAP, the preliminary college board test which was combined with the national merit test. This test had been given to selected juniors and the results are now being distributed.

Willis Fry Memorial Scholarship Established

The Willis E. Fry Memorial Science Scholarship is being established at the College of Idaho, according to Erwin H. Schiewbert, consultant in planned giving at the C of I.

A native of Nyssa, Willis Fry died in Kennewick, Washington in August of this year leaving a bequest of \$50,000 to the C of I for scholarship use.

Fry attended the C of I from 1945 to 1947, concentrating in the areas of physics and paleontology. He earned his B.S. and M.S. degrees in physics at Oregon State University of Washington.

From 1951 to 1958 he was employed as a physicist by the General Electric Company. Subsequently, he served as a physicist with the Atomic Energy Commission from 1960 to 1972. At the time of his death, he lived in Kennewick with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lon E. Fry.

Fry's longtime interest in paleontology, the study of the earth's history through fossil remains, resulted in a significant collection of fossils which was bequeathed to the University of Washington.

Regarding the memorial scholarship, Schiewbert said, "The insight and generosity that prompted Willis E. Fry to establish a memorial science scholarship fund at the C of I will bring to him a degree of immortality on this earth that all too few people ever attain. This scholarship endowment fund will from now on throughout time provide means to help worthy students of science who might otherwise have to drop out of college for financial reasons."
