



KLAAS LAAN AND DENNIS MARTIN ARE partners in L & M Farms at Adrian. They are winners this month of Dairymen's Creamery Association's (DCA) "Quality Milk Producer" award. Dennis is in charge of the farming operations and Klaas has the responsibility of the 62 Holstein cow milking herd.

The outstanding characteristic of this dairy farm is management. Laan and Martin have pooled their two farms and rent the land back to the partnership. The partnership owns all the machinery. In order to meet any contingencies that might arise in the future, Klaas and Dennis entered into a full agreement of partnership January 1, 1971.

Mr. and Mrs. Klaas Laan came from Holland in 1948 and started shipping milk from one cow to Dairymen's Creamery Association in 1951. Dennis was raised in the Homedale-Marsing area. He graduated from the University of Idaho in 1969 with a B.S. degree in Agriculture and later married the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Laan. They have two children, Tracy, 6, and Russell, 3 years old.

L & M is a member of DHIA with a rolling herd average of 15,600 lbs. of milk and 540 lbs. of fat. They started their present operation three years ago with 28 Wisconsin heifers so their herd is young. They bought no cows and keep all their young stock. With freshening heifers, they will be milking 80 cows by next January 1.

Another outstanding feature of the L & M Farms is the management of crops raised on their 184 acres of irrigated land. Crops are alfalfa, corn and grain which goes to the milking herd and Holstein steers. Klaas and Dennis always get four cuttings of hay.

L & M is completely tied into good management practices. Klaas says "We talk over all management problems. If you don't have good management, pretty soon you'll have nothing."

The Laans and Martins have a new Nevada type double-four herringbone milking parlor. Most of the interior construction is with glazed block.
