Oregon Cattlemen Stress Importance of Energy Fuels

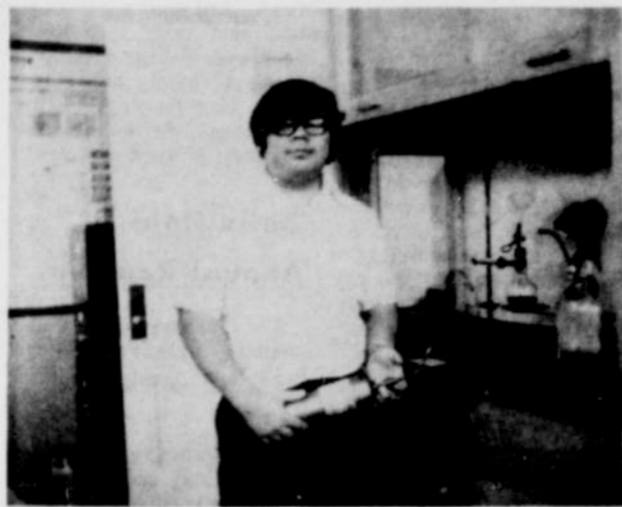
"The Oregon Cattlemen's Association has taken steps to remind administrative officials in Washington DC as well as the Governor's office in Salem of the critical importance of adequate fuel for the total job of processing, producing and transporting food—particularly where a perishable commodity like beef is involved," according to Donald Ostense, Executive Vice-President of the Oregon Cattlemen's Association in a luncheon speech to The Dalles Lion's Club and members of the Wasco County Livestock Association. (noon, December 11, Civic Auditorium, The Dalles.)

"This morning our Association sent telegrams to Mr. William Simon the nation's energy crisis director in Washington, D.C.; to Governor McCall; and to Oregon Executive Director, David Piper, Oregon Energy Counsel on fuel allocations and conservation, informing them that it is most vital that we keep commodities flowing through the complete food pipe-line, all the way from farm-ranch to the supermarket. If fuel shortages interrupt the flow at any point, particularly where we are dealing with live animals or perishable foods, the entire production and marketing system is disrupted. Oregon cattlemen are supporting the position of the American National Cattlemen's Association that the administration's new 'super energy agency' include a special departmental section which would be concerned exclusively with energy and fuel as it pertains to all food stuffs. We specifically point out to the newly appointed energy director, William Simon, the need for a 'food desk' to deal with daily problems relating to food production, processing and distribution," Ostense said.

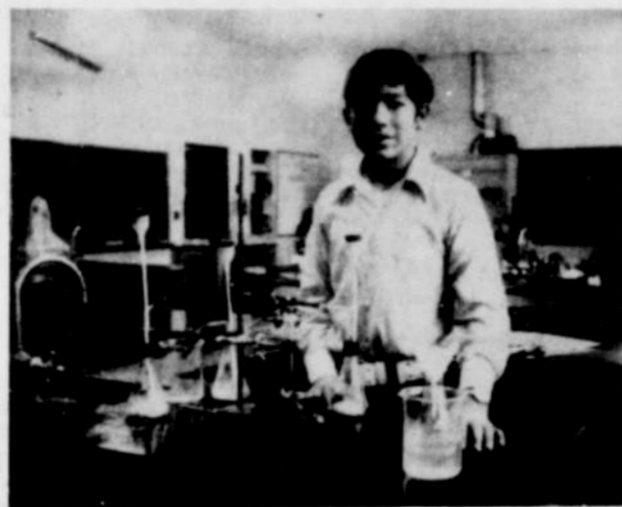
Biology 11 Research Projects



JOE JOYCE'S PROJECT INVOLVES hair analysis. Joe is measuring tensile strength and other properties of hair.



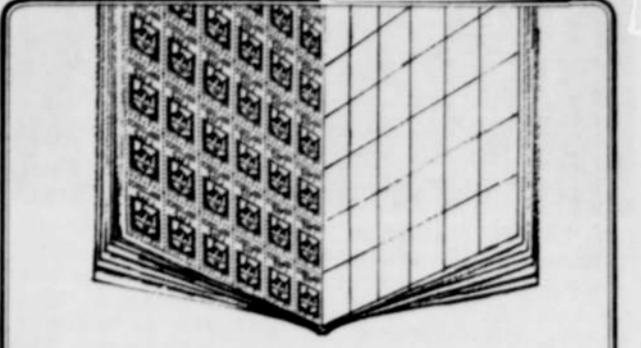
JIMMY SHIMOMAEDA IS TESTING effects of various gases on the growth of lichens.
