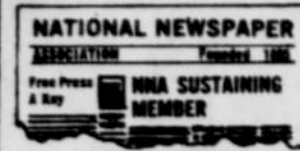

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In Memorium

One of the principle functions of a newspaper is to chronicle the births and deaths, engagements and marriages, life and happenings of the citizens of the community.

Events of the past three weeks have left all of us stunned and saddened, and before it is too late we wish to give special recognition to the deaths of five very prominent citizens. Each of them contributed so much to this town and area, and we refer to Howard Myrick, Lynn Snodgrass, Irl Nolen, Herb Fisher and Ted Brammer.

Howard Myrick, only 53, died suddenly of a heart attack. A prominent businessman, Howard was active as a volunteer fireman, former school board member, and community leader.

Lynn Snodgrass, 70, was particularly active in horse activities. He served for many years as president and a member of the board of the Nyssa Nite Rodeo and only two years ago helped to revitalize the rodeo board and served again as its president.

Irl Nolen, 67, retired two years ago after almost a lifetime in the education business. Important in the lives of some of our more gifted students in junior high school, he helped organize the Mexican PTA and the All-American clubs, helping to improve the lot of many of our Mexican-American citizens.

Herb Fisher, 61, was a prominent rancher who died suddenly last week. Active in the Masons and Shrine Club, he was one of the many citizens who gave of their time and money to help start Malheur Memorial Hospital.

Ted Brammer, 66, publisher for ten years of the Gate City Journal. Active in the Nyssa Chamber of Commerce and civic affairs, Ted was an avid sportsman, hunter, fisherman, bowler and golfer.

Each week we record other deaths. Each one just as important to their loved ones and friends. Usually, they have lived out their productive lives.

Within such a short period each of these five died suddenly, in most cases before their time, and with their passing left a real void. To each of their widows, and families, we express our sympathy and that of the community.

bility to participate in the program include: women who are 35 years of age and older who have no known signs or symptoms of breast cancer; women must be ambulatory; women who are pregnant or nursing are excluded; a woman with a unilateral mastectomy is acceptable.

All of the Clinic Board has asked to meet with the I.M.C. to negotiate, but they have always discriminated against us. They have never paid any attention to us. There are many of us who are very hurt, and if we continue in this I don't know where we will end up.

I want that you recognize the minority and not the I.M.C. See that we work for thousands of persons who exist in poverty with salaries that do not even allow them to live and their children die for lack of medical attention. Now that there has begun to be something, it is being taken away.

RANCHERS, have you noticed the increased pressures to reduce or eliminate livestock grazing from public lands? You should have a real interest in the Society for Range Management and its efforts to help circumvent this movement.

This Society presents scientific and practical facts in public forums at field, national and international levels; it has a strong youth education program; it is contributing strongly to better communications and working relationships between individuals, agencies, programs that affect ranchers.

The Society for Range Management recognizes that because of the inherent nature of rangelands, livestock grazing is most often a principal rangeland use, and that the production of animal protein from rangeland is of vital importance in meeting the nutritional needs of an expanding world population.

The Society further recognizes the value of livestock as a potent management tool to bring about desired trends or changes in plant communities to achieve objectives in watershed management, wildlife habitat improvement, or enhancing recreational and aesthetic qualities.

The Malheur County Chapter of the Pacific Northwest Section of the Society for Range Management has recently been formed. Their next meeting will be on January 29, 1974, at Treasure Valley Community College. Any ranchers or others interested in national use of range lands are most welcome. REV. TONY MALDONADO

This week's pastor is the Reverend Tony Maldonado. He is the pastor of the Latin Assembly of God Church in Nyssa. Tony came to Nyssa in October of 1973 and lives in a new home at 211 Emison Avenue with his wife, Margarita, and two-year-old daughter Leeann.

Prior to coming to Nyssa, Tony was the Associate Pastor of The Bethel Temple Latin American Assembly of God Church in Phoenix, Arizona.

Tony had not planned for the ministry. His life-long ambition had been to be an officer with the FBI and had a scholarship to attend the FBI Academy. But God had other plans and after being prompted by The Lord, Tony entered the Latin American Bible Institute of El Paso, Texas.

While in school, and still not knowing God's will for his life, Tony heard a speaker telling of the sudden death of a well-known Spanish American pastor. The speaker while telling of this death said that someone would have to 'fill the gap' the death of this pastor had made. During the sermon, Tony bowed his head and promised God he would do whatever God wanted him to do and would go wherever God wanted him to go. After that prayer, Tony's life began a journey which led to Nyssa, Oregon.

In this column I would like to, for a moment, salute Billy Graham and his associates. Tony is among hundreds of pastors and missionaries who found Christ in a Billy Graham Crusade. His 'hour of decision' came in 1961 at the Tempe Sun Devil Stadium Crusade in Tempe, Arizona.

Just a few days ago Tony and the congregation of the Latin Assembly of God Church purchased the land west of St. Bridget's Catholic Church where this spring they will begin building the new Latin Assembly of God Church. On behalf of Tony and his congregation, I want to thank the many people in the Nyssa area who have helped to make the purchase possible. When the new church is built, you will share in the feelings of satisfaction that will be felt by all who have had a part. Needless to say Tony, his Associate Pastor, Jim Pena and the congregation whom they pastor are excited about these days in their church.

If you don't know Tony, meet him. The other pastors of this area along with myself feel fortunate to share Christ's ministry with him.

Ted M. Brammer

Ted Manuel Brammer, 66, died Sunday evening, January 13, 1974 at Malheur Memorial Hospital, following an extended illness. Mr. Brammer was a former publisher of the Nyssa Gate City Journal.

He was born March 24, 1907, a son of Jerry and Lydia Galloway Brammer, at Green Forest, Arkansas where he attended elementary school. He received his high school education at The School of the Ozarks near Branson, Missouri and in Berryville, Arkansas. He also studied at the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville and served in the Marine Corps during World War II. He was a member of the Berryville Presbyterian Church, the Nyssa Eagles Lodge and American Legion Post No. 79.

Ted was married at Berryville in 1932 to Dorothy Mary Boydston who preceded him in death. On October 4, 1947 he was united in marriage to Vona Arlene Peck at Eureka Springs, Arkansas.

For many years, the deceased owned and operated the Trimble Insurance Agency in Berryville, and in April, 1959 he and his wife Arlene, purchased the Nyssa Gate City Journal which they published for over ten years.

In addition to his widow of the home in Nyssa, Ted is survived by his mother, Mrs. Lydia Emmett of Townsend, Montana; two brothers, George Z. and Harold W., also of Townsend; two sisters, Wanda Brammer of Berryville, Ark. and Mrs. W. R. (Mary) Latham of Del Rio, Texas. His father preceded him in death in 1950.

Services were conducted by the Rev. Robert Manley of the Nazarene Church at 8 p.m., Wednesday evening, at the Lienkaemper Chapel in Nyssa. Concluding services and interment will be at Townsend, Montana.

The family suggests memorials to Malheur Memorial Hospital in Nyssa or to the Presbyterian Church in Berryville, Arkansas.
