Favorite Recipes

This meat loaf is bound to be a hit with meat-and-macaroni fans and it is perfect for any occasion. It is ready for the table in just about an hour. Garnish with steamed red and green pepper rings.

BEEF-MACARONI LOAF

MACARONI LAYERS

- 1 pkg. (8 oz.) elbow macaroni
- 2 Tbs. butter or margarine
- 2 Tbs. flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1 egg
- 2 cups milk
- 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese

MEAT LAYER

- 1 small onion, chopped
- 1 Tbs. butter or margarine
- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
- 1 egg
- 1 can condensed tomato soup
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper

SAUCE

- 1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 1/4 tsp. basil

Grease a loaf pan, line bottom and ends with a double-thick strip of foil, leaving a 1-inch overhang. Cook macaroni, following label directions; drain; return to kettle. Stir in butter or margarine, sprinkle flour, salt and pepper over; toss to mix well. Beat egg, stir in milk, pour over macaroni mixture. Cook, stirring constantly, over medium heat, until thickened; remove from heat, stir in Parmesan cheese.

Saute onion in butter or margarine until soft; add ground beef and brown, breaking meat with fork. Beat egg; stir in 1/2 can of tomato soup, salt and pepper.

Spoon half of the macaroni mixture in an even layer in prepared pan; top with all of the meat mixture, then remaining macaroni mixture. Bake at 350 degrees about 1 hour.

Heat tomato sauce with 1/2 can remaining tomato soup, sugar and basil, simmer for 2 to 3 minutes.

Cool loaf in pan 10 minutes; loosen from sides with knife, lift up ends of foil and set loaf on a heated serving platter; slide out foil. When serving, spoon sauce over individual loaf slices.

Livestock Leader Predicts Food Prices To Stabilize

"There is every indication that this nation will have record crops and livestock production in 1974. Because of this, I see food prices stabilizing starting about May and remaining stable for the second half of this year," so stated Ernie Davis, President, Oregon Cattlemen's Association, at the annual meeting of the Jefferson County Livestock Association meeting in Madras.

"Increased prices to food and livestock producers in 1973 have been an excellent incentive for producers throughout the nation to increase production. There is evidence in Oregon and throughout farm communities all over America that because of the profit incentive all food production will increase." Davis emphasized that, "the American consumer must be made aware that livestock producers and feeders are also caught in the inflationary squeeze. Livestock feed costs have more than doubled over one year ago; la-

bor costs are up; baling wire for our hay has gone from \$12 a box to over \$40 a box, if you can get it, in just one year. Therefore, it is very necessary that the producers of food and fiber of this country are allowed to make a fair and equitable profit if we are to continue to feed the nation."

Also speaking on the program was OCA Executive Vice-President, Donald Ostensoe who stated that, "one of the most important and positive programs announced for 1974, as far as the Beef Cattle Industry is concerned is that the US Court of Appeals ruled that the Food and Drug Administration acted illegally last year in banning DES (diethylstilbestrol). Therefore, the FDA has announced that DES can continue to be used in livestock feed and as implants. The use of this growth hormone will probably save the American consumer somewhere between 8% - 10% in their beef purchases during the coming year."
