Consumer Portfolio on Purchase of Mobile Homes

Even the most careful consumer can be confused by all the decisions to be made when considering the purchase of a mobile home.

Now, the Oregon State University Extension Service can help you ask the "right kinds of questions before you make that final decision," says Helen Conner, Extension Home Economist.

The help is the new Consumer Portfolio on Buying a Mobile Home which is designed to help the consumer look at all the angles before he buys.

"Our goal is to get the potential buyer to look at his final decision from all sides," adds Dorothy Brown, OSU extension housing-home furnishings specialist who assembled the portfolio. "By suggesting questions which should be asked, we hope the consumer can avoid that 'if I had only

Known" feeling after the purchase."

Materials in the portfolio will help the consumer compare the cost of different kinds of housing and give him a brief look at his rights as a mobile home buyer under Oregon's new Consumer Warranty Act. It also includes information on such basic considerations as construction, home site selection, design and insurance.

The Consumer Guidelines will help the prospective buyer ask important questions about mobile home

parks and subdivisions, about taxes and assessment procedures, about what mortgage lenders require, and about floor plans, options and other features of the mobile home itself.

Copies of the portfolio are now available from the Malheur County Extension Office in Ontario City Hall.
