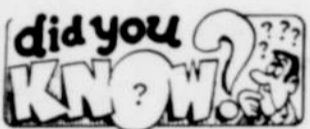

ENERGY TALKS

"Should the consumer's number one objective be the lowest possible price for his gasoline and fuel oil?"

"What the consumer's first objective ought to be is to have enough gasoline and fuel oil to satisfy his needs. Once he is assured of that, then his second objective should be to obtain them at the lowest possible price. Prices so low that they result in inadequate supply are not in the best interests of consumers."

Mr. Davis was principal author of the National Petroleum Council's "U.S. Energy Outlook" prepared for the U.S. Interior Department.
