Workmen's Compensation Assessment Raised

Oregon employers and their employes will soon be paying an additional daily assessment to the State Workmen's Compensation Board, so that benefits paid to previously injured workers can be raised.

The scheduled April 1 increase was authorized by the recent special session of the Oregon Legislature, which instructed the Workmen's Compensation Board to raise the assessment against Oregon employers from three to six-cents-a-day (\$1.32 a month) for each worker employed. In addition, the emassessment was raised from five to eightcents-a-day (\$1.76 a month). These assessments are to be collected from the employer by his workmen's compensation insurance carrier.

The largest of these car-

riers is SAIF, the State Accident Insurance Fund, which insures some 40,000 Oregon employers. Don Clark, SAIF's Baker District Office Manager, is concerned that area employers are unaware of this increase or its April 1 effective date.

"Many employers, especially the political subdivisions, will need to consider this change when reviewing their 1974-75 budgets." he said. "When you're dealing with a large number of employes within tight budget restrictions, even an increase of a few cents a day can really make a difference.

Clark said SAIF is personally contacting as many of its policyholders as possible and will soon be sending notices to all 40,000 of

SEEDLING TREES FOR PLANTING

Oregon rural residents who need seedling trees to plant for Christmas tree production, or wind breaks have a low cost source of the little trees through the Oregon State Department of Forestry. Each year the department grows millions of the little trees that are distributed throughout the state to help keep Oregon green. Malheur county residents have been taking advantage of the program for many Many of the trees were planted as wind breaks in this area, years ago during the development of the new lands under the Vale and Owyhee irrigation projects. Blowing dust and wind erosion were quite a problem

Most of the seedlings from the state nursery are less than a foot long and come in bundles of 50 trees. Cost of the trees ranges from \$3.50 to \$6.00 for 50 seedlings depending on the species you select.

Early spring is the best time to set out the young However, orders should be placed as soon as possible to insure that your request is taken care of as the nursery usually exhausts its supply during the early spring period. You can order now and the nursery will ship the trees on the date you specify.
