The Breast Cancer Detection Center opened its doors last October. The facilities are funded for two years by the American Cancer Society and National Cancer Institute. In this two- year period, they hope to establish the permanent need for this center. 

Breast cancer is the greatest cancer killer of American women. One out of every 15 girls born in the United States is destined to develop breast cancer. However, the

chances of curing breast cancer is excellent if the disease is diagnosed and treated while in the early stages. In the short time the Boise center has been operation, several very small cancers have been discovered and cured by surgery. The ultramodern equipment used enables detection as much as three years in advance. This means the difference between removal of a cyst or lump, or having a drastic mastectomy. Major surgery involves additional treatment and medications. It is not necessary or very wise to take any chances now. Just because the examination is free, don't make the mistake of minimizing its value. It would cost from \$60 on up to receive the same kind of an examination, even if it were available. If you get a clean bill of health, which 99% of the women do, you have the peace of mind in knowing that you
