BUDGET AND COSTS IN-CREASE

During the past six weeks, two items in your budget have jumped clear out of sight. They are fertilizer and fuel costs. If you have made your 1974 budget, it may be well to take another look at these items and make sure that you have enough to take care of the increases that have hit the past few weeks.

Indications are that fertilizers have increased between 80 and 100% during the past six weeks and are still going up. Fuels for farm deliveries have gone up close to 25-30% in the past six weeks and they too are still going up; so keep your eyes on these two items and be ready to make some quick responses, so that you don't get 3/4 through the season and find yourself falling short of your projected
