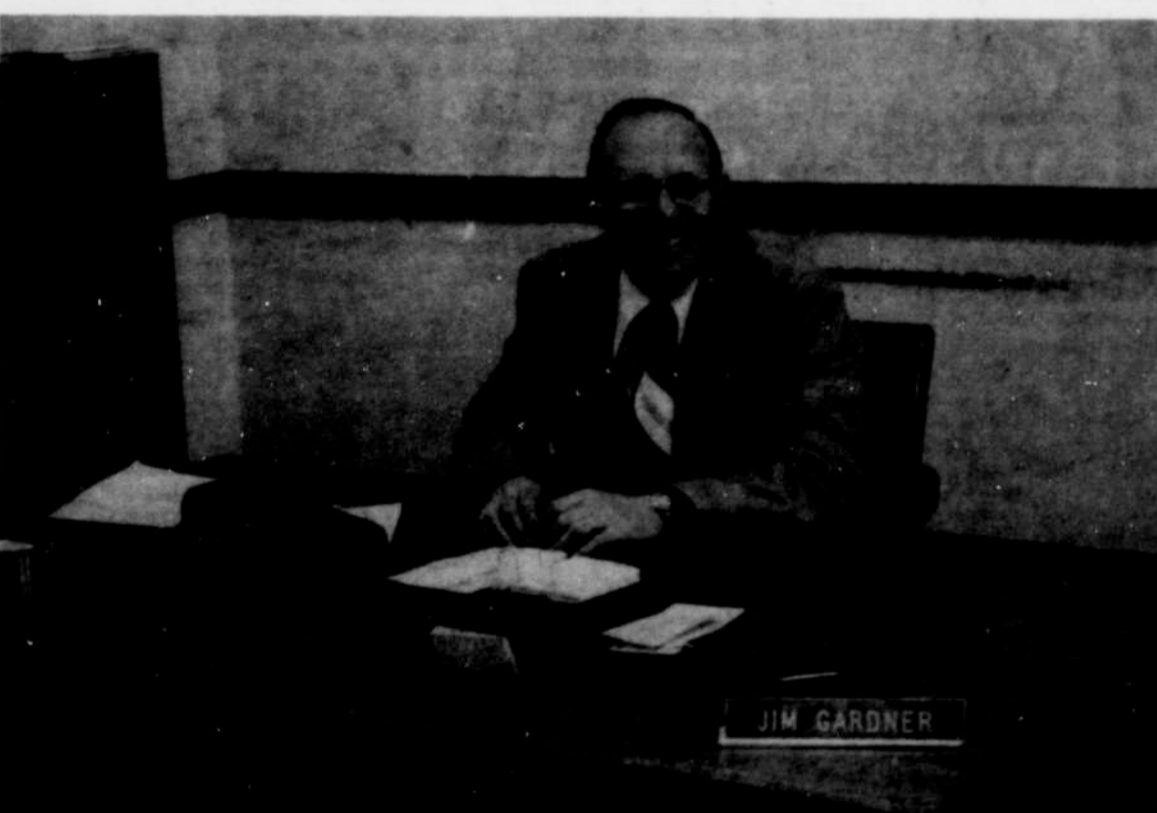
Mrs. A. C. Sallee Is In Hospital
