The United States Navy continues to offer a very rewarding and satisfying career with a variety of available educational and training programs and numerous trade schools all designed to fit individual desires.

Presently a number of qualified young men from this community and the surrounding area are taking advantage of the many fine opportunities offered to them through enlistment in the regular navy. Then—there are many others, who for various reasons, are by-passing these fine and outstan-

ding financial, educational and career benefits. Perhaps they are not aware of the many available opportunities or it may be that they hold some awareness about a 3, 4, or 6 year enlistment. For those interested and deserving young people there are the new and improved Naval Reserve Programs. These are programs designed and considered ideal for this particular community and the times.

Programs exist in which a young man involved in the community and it's future can LEARN, EARN and RETURN. According to the area Chief Recruiter for the Navy, Max Chavez, USN, Programs designed for the Navy, the individual and the community are the Navy's new "READY MARINER" Program and the 2x6 Program. Both offer a chance to sample Navy life for as little as 4 to 10 months or less, or up to 28 months of Active Duty for Training, during which time the Reservist receives all pay and allowances, advancement opportunities and all fringe benefits. This is done on a weekly or monthly basis and can be termed as a part-time job that guarantees continuing financial
