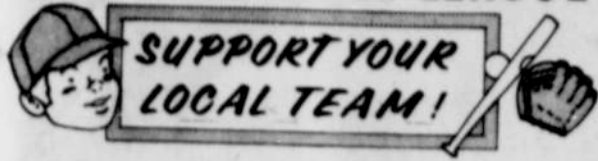


BOYS' BASEBALL LEAGUE

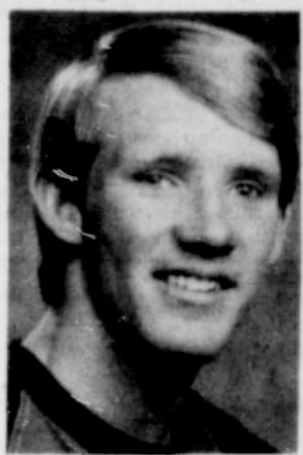
