

New Agricultural Inspector Named

A new Safety Compliance Officer has been named to conduct agricultural employer inspections in the Baker-Malheur Counties area by the Accident Prevention Division.

George J. Rolfe, Ontario, is now inspecting farm, ranch and other agricultural employers for the Pendleton district of the APD, under provisions of the Oregon Safe Employment Act (OSEA).

Prior to joining the Division, Rolfe owned and operated a row crop operation and served five years in the U. S. Coast Guard.

Rolfe says many employers in the area are apparently unaware that the district headquarters office in Pendleton is now fully manned during working hours and that they can obtain assistance with safety problems from the district's technical consultant there. Jordan Valley Loan Approved For Water

The Farmers Home Administration has approved a loan of \$220,000 and a grant of \$20,000 under the Rural Development Program to the City of Jordan Valley in Malheur County, Oregon, to construct a domestic water system for 90 families in the City, announced Kenneth Keudell the Agency's State Director.

The loan will be repaid in 40 years at an interest rate of five percent.

Loans for water system projects supportive of rural community development are made under the Rural Development Act of 1972 by the Farmers Home Administration, the rural credit

service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Benefits of the program are made available without regard to race, color, creed, sex or national origin.

The loan and grant are being processed through the Ontario County Office of the Farmers Home Administration under the direction of Don Kudrna, County Supervisor serving Malheur and Harney Counties.

Veterans Will Sell \$100 Million In Bonds

The Department of Veterans Affairs will sell \$100 million in loan bonds July 9 as the result of passage of Measure 5 in the May primary, H. C. Saalfeld, director, said today.

Measure 5, approved by the voters by a 70 percent majority, increased the limit of bonds that may be issued to obtain Oregon veterans farm and home loan funds. It raised the limit by \$497 million.

Saalfeld said veterans applying starting June 3 may

have to wait until proceeds from the July bond sale are received in the first week of August. Earlier, May applicants also were informed they would have to wait for funds until September if Measure 5 failed. Saalfeld said, but passage of the measure permitted the release of enough funds to take care of the May applicants.

Veterans have been borrowing from the program at an unprecedented rate of nearly 1230 loans a month averaging \$26.5 million, according to Saalfeld.

Interstate Moving of Livestock

Livestock producers, both dairy and beef should plan to avail themselves of the opportunity to learn about new directives on interstate movement of breeding cattle into Oregon to be presented by the State Department of Agriculture, June 18 at 8:00 p.m. in W-10 of the Weese Building on the Treasure Valley Community College campus.

New regulations are to be put into effect to check imported breeding cattle to assure that no brucellosis carriers are brought into the state. Dr. Glenn Rea, Oregon State Veterinarian will explain the problem and the proposed program to handle this emergency situation.
