Range Owners Complete Spray

Private Range owners in Malheur County are completing spraying some 16,000 acres of sagebrush infected ranges this month, according to George Bain, County Extension Agent.

With this years program some 220,000 acres of private rangeland has been treated for sagebrush control since 1968. By controlling sagebrush, the available moisture and plant nutrients are released for production of grasses and other good forage plants at least doubling the forage production where good understory of desireable grasses exists. This practice has added some 30,000 additional animal unit months of feed in the county. This is a boost to the valuable livestock industry in Malheur County, Bain said.
