stood along with principles involving maintenance of a healthy mind and body. And skills must be acquired enabling a person to become a life-long learner.

Second element requires an ability to cope as a citizen with government, the environment, on streets and highways and as a consumer of goods and services. The third element asks students to develop career skills, good work habits and attitudes, ability to maintain good inter-personal relationships and appropriate career de cisions.

Study subjects have increased by two-from 19 to 21. Formerly students were required to earn 19 credits-10 of which were elective. Number of electives remains the same but courses in Personal Finance and Career Education have been added to the non-elective credit

category. Districts are permitted certain flexibilities. For instance, some may waive present attendance requirements and permit students to complete regular courses of study in 11 years or extend it for others to 13 years.

Some districts will allow independent study, work experience, college credit alternatives, certificates of competency, credit by examination-only five of a dozen options now available.

Already 51 of Oregon's 180 high school districts have filed plans for the new program. Representatives of many of the remainder are working with an Education Department task force at Willamette University this week. And all are expected to have filed initial plans of implementation by July 1. Reasons for the new

requirements are many: times certainly have changed since 1932. The needs for career development are obvious. Employment patterns have undergone extensive modifications. But one of the most significant changes during the last three decades has occurred in the marketplace.

The new high school graduation require m e n t s tend to emphasize personal finance and consumer educa-This appears highly appropriate when one considers Oregon's rate of personal bankruptcy as recent as 1972 was twice the national average and only two other states had higher rates. At the same time Oregon has reduced the age of majority from 21 to 18, making high school age youth responsible for their own contracts and

schools last spring.

In plain language students surveyed flunked the test. They know most about employment and income. somewhat less about how to judge goods and services they buy and least about use of credit, their legal rights, responsibilites and the management of money.

Most know the responsibilities of job success and about the same percentage know how to get a job. But barely half understand employment opportunities. Their knowledge of financial planning, banking and insurance is dismal. In fact of all categories tested, it was seldom the percentage of correct response exceeded 60 per cent!
