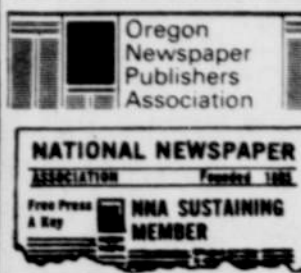

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THE SAD SAGA OF PATRICIA HEARST

Five months following the kidnapping of Patricia Hearst by the communist guerrilla gang, the "Symbionese Liberation Army," it was confirmed by law enforcement officials: Miss Hearst was wanted as a willing participant in a number of violent and vicious crimes.

Missed in the news is the fact that at least two anti-communist experts, many weeks before, had predicted (with great accuracy, as it has turned out) that Miss Hearst had indeed been "brainwashed" and was not, as commonly believed at the time, an unwilling accomplice.

In early April, Dr. Fred Schwarz, President of the Christian Anti-Communism Crusade of Long Beach, California, described the brainwashing process by which Patricia Hearst was transformed into a member of the Symbionese Liberation Army and further predicted: "She could be given some difficult and criminal task to test her and make her burn her bridges."

Within the week after Dr. Schwarz wrote his prediction, Miss Hearst, holding an automatic rifle in her hands, robbed a bank with other members of the S.L.A.

Mr. Edward Hunter, Editor and Publisher of *Tactics*, a "Monthly Psywar Journal" (Arlington, Virginia) appeared on an NBC television "talk show" in April and also emphatically maintained that Miss Hearst had indeed been brainwashed. Dubious, the moderator of the TV show asked: "Yes, but in 60 days, can that process work?"

Patently, Hunter explained that "brainwashing is composed of two processes: a softening up process and an indoctrination process.... she was softened up before she was ever captured. In other words, it was not a matter of 60 days. It was a matter of several years, plus 60 days. She was indoctrinated before capture.... at Berkeley."

Hunter, of course, is not the first to warn of the disastrous effects imposed upon our youth through slanted textbooks commonly found in public schools today; through "hate-America" messages constantly repeated in some segments of the academic community; and of the extreme, radical, violence-prone elements to be found in such leading institutions as the University of California at Berkeley; except that most Americans seriously underestimate the impact of such pro-communist, anti-American influences upon our youth.

Both Dr. Schwarz and Mr. Hunter were right; Miss Hearst had indeed been brainwashed. But the important fact is that the "brainwashing" had already begun long before she was kidnapped; it was relatively easy, therefore, for the S.L.A. to bring her the rest of the way.

Navy Announces New Reserve Options

New and improved options designed to further improve and support the New Navy's image to young qualified men have recently been put into effect. The Navy guarantees three (3) active duty options for men enlisting in the New Ready Mariner Program according to Navy Chief Max Chavez. Involved is a 90-day trial program available to non-prior service men who can qualify for enlistment.

Generally the Ready Mariner Program allows a man to enlist but only provides from 4 to 10 months of Active Duty for Training, usually just enough time for basic training and to attend a class "A" school. Then he returns home and completes his obligation by attending training at a nearby Navy Reserve Unit.

Now, with the improved change, the enlistee can choose other options during his recruit training. (1) He may continue with the provisions of the original contract and serve only the 4 to 20 months of Active Duty for Training which probably includes a class "A" school

guarantee before returning home, or (2) he may extend his Active Duty for Training time for two or three years or (3) he may enlist in the Regular Navy for four or six years.

Until the new options came out the Ready Mariner Program only provided enough Active Duty time, 4 to 10 months, for recruit training and a selected school.

The primary advantage(s) now allows a man to return home after sampling Navy life for 4 to 10 months, or he may now become eligible for the GI Bill educational benefits if he decides to accept the 2 or 3 year active duty option. Also, after sampling Navy life, the young man, who may have originally been somewhat unsure, may decide he really likes Navy life and wants to ship into the Regular Navy.

Regardless of the option selected the Program(s), primarily designed to fulfill the needs of the Naval Service, also were made for the benefit of a young man and his community.
