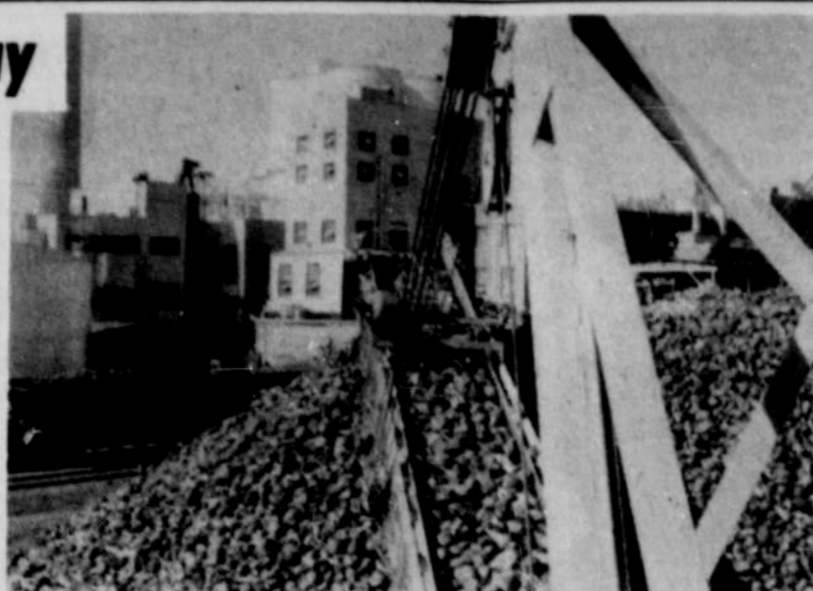


Sugar Beet Stockpiling Underway
