All entries must be made for American yarn or American loomed, cnitted or felted wool. The fabric or yarn must be at least 70% wool. The competition, which is both a sewing or knitting and fashion competition is open to all American citizens

regardless of race, color or

creed who meet the age and

other requirements as set

forth for the competition. There are three categories for the District Competition: Pre-teens, ages 10-13; Juniors ages 14-16; and Seniors ages 17-21. Only the Junior and Senior categories are eligible for state and national competition, with the category entered depending upon the entrant's age
