One could count on such plantings to be ready for harvesting just before a major holiday, like Thanksgiving or Christmas.

It was considered that I was a real menace to this joy-juce, for, usually I'd accidentally find at least one jug, it's top rising a bit from the soil amid the daisies, and would extract it from its hiding place and turn it in to the top brass, who had,

incidentally, been pressuring me to find the stuff. There the fermenting, stinking mess was promptly disposed of with exclamations of extreme disgust.

So much for my wild past.

The Methodist Church bazaar was a rip-roaring success, made money and kept us madly rushing around most of Saturday. I waited tables, you know, brushed crumbs onto the floor and replaced used dishes and silver with clean ones. We had ten card tables, each with a red checked table cloth and centerpiece.

Each of the women's groups had its own table with a pair of beaming ladies to sell from it. Seems as if all the church women were involved, one way or another, if only as customers.
