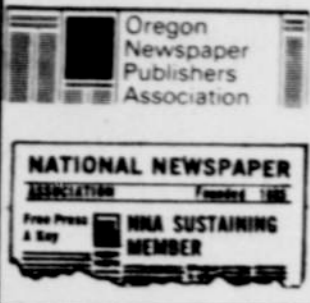

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Hospital Auxiliary Deserves Support

The Malheur Memorial Hospital Auxiliary has devoted a great deal of time and energy over the years to provide our hospital with much needed equipment. Idaho Power Endorses Christmas Lighting Policy

Idaho Power Company, endorsing a national energy policy on Christmas lighting, Wednesday suggested restraint on outdoor lighting displays and reminded customers that "little or no" overall energy savings can be achieved by limiting use of interior holiday lighting.

W. H. Hanes, general manager of the company's service department, pointed out that Idaho Power customers "are fortunate to have a renewable hydro source of electricity which puts their Christmas lighting in a different perspective from most of the nation."

"All interior lighting, Christmas or other, contributes usable heat in the home, lessening the need for other heat energies, which are in short supply," Hanes said. "Therefore, our customers should be advised that little or no overall energy savings can be achieved by restricting their use of interior Christmas lighting."

"However, because outdoor Christmas lighting contests tend to promote increased use of Christmas lighting, Idaho Power policy is not to participate in such contests."

In a statement outlining the Federal Energy Administration's stand, Region X Administrator Jack B. Robertson, Seattle, said his agency has no plans to ban decorative lighting, but instead urges a policy of restraint.

"Holiday lighting can be used sensibly and tastefully," he said, adding that "decorations are enhanced by using lights to accent rather than overwhelm."

Ore-Ida Adds New Section

A new potato processing line, which may add 300 to the 840 employees at Ore-Ida Food Inc. in Ontario, is expected to start operating January 6.

The \$7.5 million plant expansion was expected to be completed by December 2, Glen Schwarting, factory manager, said, but delivery of equipment has delayed the opening. He said one of the most difficult parts to obtain, an electrical switch gear, has arrived.

With the additional capacity, the company plans to operate 11 months a year. Previously the plant has ceased operation early in the winter and remained closed until corn and onion processing started in the summer.

The company added five new cellars this past year, one in Ontario, two at Homedale and two at Hammett. All are full of potatoes in anticipation for the spring run, Schwarting said.

The expansion project has taken place primarily inside the plant and consists mainly of equipment installation, with few major changes to the exterior of the plant.

Nurses Alerted To Changes In License Renewal Rules

Unless they begin soon to prepare for license renewals, more than 2,000 registered nurses may find themselves unable to practice nursing in Oregon as of July 1, 1975.

Beverly C. Andre', Executive Director of the Oregon State Board of Nursing, issued a reminder today that nurses can no longer remain inactive indefinitely and continue to renew licenses every two years simply by paying a fee.

be designated by the Board. In other words, the inactive nurse must complete a Board approved re-entry course in order to renew a license.

Rules adopted this year by the Board of Nursing allow a nurse who has worked part-time for approximately six months or more during a five-year period to be exempt from the re-entry program requirement. Prorating the minimum work requisite on an annual basis, it means that a nurse will be eligible for license renewal consideration if he or she has practiced nursing 48 days or more during the one-year period ending June 30, 1975.
