Combine corn syrup, sugar and salt and water and cook syrup to light crack state (256 degrees). Beat egg whites until stiff, gradually add boiling syrup, beating constantly. Continue beating until mixture holds its shape when dropped from a spoon. Add vanilla. Add nut meats and cherries if desired. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto a greased cooky sheet. Makes 48 pieces. (Chocolate Chips may be added instead of cherries)

1 lb. glazed cherries, cut up l lb. dark seedless raisins

1 lb. white seedless raisins

1 lb. glazed pineapple Cream butter, add sugar and mix until well blended. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Sift together flour, soda, cloves, salt, and nutmeg. Add liquids to creamed mixture. Stir in sifted dry ingredients. Mix nuts and fruits, add 1/2 cup flour to them and fold into cookie dough. Drop onto cookie sheet (greased) and bake at 325 degrees for 12 to 15 minutes. Makes about 144

Carrot Drop Cookies


1 cup shortening cup sugar
