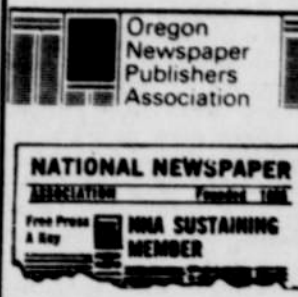

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Payette's New Auditorium

Payette High School's new "dome" gym and the auditorium and classroom complex were officially dedicated Friday evening, November 15. The comments we heard ranged from "beautiful" to "fantastic".

Because of its novelty, the "dome" gym came in for a major share of the attention. And it is, without a doubt, something the community can be extremely proud of.

Also included in the dedication was the new auditorium and it, we suspect, will equal the "dome" in serving the community. Not everyone is interested in attending athletic events, popular though they may be. The auditorium fills a need that has long been felt here. Up until now, plays, musical concerts, speeches and programs of this nature had to be held in the old gymnasium where acoustics were anything but desirable.

The new auditorium solves all that. The theatre-type seating is comfortable and the "step-down" floor makes the large stage easily visible to all. The acoustics are excellent. It has seating for 630 people, adequate for virtually all events, with the possible exception of commencement.

It should encourage more cultural productions, increase attendance and provide greater enjoyment of them.

Superintendent's Corner

The School Building Committee has decided on a package to present to the voters January 28, 1975.

The total package to be voted on represents replacement of burned facilities and the addition of the Elementary Multi-Purpose Room to replace the Old Gym and a Vocational Building to be built alongside the Ag. Shop. The Multi-Purpose Room and the Vocational Building were top priority recommendations of the 1970 Building Committee. The amount of the bond issue is \$2,354,000. \$4 per thousand will be the cost figured at 7% on bonds amortized on 20 years. Bonds are selling now at a lower rate. Due to the bonds being paid off this year by the School District, the total increase will be about \$3.50 per thousand increase in taxes.

The high school-gym-auditorium is a well planned unit

that will give us a good secondary educational plant. The cafeteria is a very basic building without a stage and is used for cafeteria purposes from about 10:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

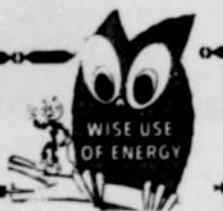

Home Making Tips



Saving on Heat:

In the past year there has been a lot of discussion centering around energy. Most home owners would like to save money on maintaining a home.

You can save money and conserve energy by heating your home with an electric heat pump. How does a heat pump work? On mild temperature days the heat pump handles all heating needs. When the temperature drops below freezing a two-stage thermostat activates another heating system to supplement the heat pump.

Surprisingly there is heat in the air right down to absolute zero (459 degrees F. below zero). A heat pump extracts heat from outdoor air and brings it into the house. The heat pump also works the opposite in the summer, extracting heat from inside the house.

Studies indicate a heat pump is about 1 1/2 times more efficient than conventional electric resistance heat-

ing. Some critics, skeptical of claims made by heat pump manufacturers, point out that at below freezing a heat pump could cost as much to operate as conventional heating systems. While this may be true, it is unlikely to cost more. The greatest savings exists during the months outside temperature is between 30 - 60 degrees. Variables such as insulation, house size and geographic location can affect heating costs. Those variables can also affect labor and maintenance costs.

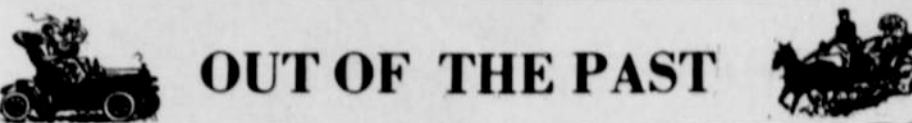

Invisible Smoke
Air Tests Foiled
By Utility Plant

HUNTINGTON, Utah (UPI) — The Utah Division of Health, checking antipollution devices at Utah Power & Light Co.'s new Huntington Power Plant, found them to be too efficient.

North American Weather Consultants, an environmental studies company investigating air movement and gas concentration in the Castle-Dale-Emery County area, found they couldn't gather samples from the smoke plume because it was not visible.

The investigation was being conducted prior to construction of a separate two-unit power plant with an 860-

megawatt capacity. The Huntington plant, with a capacity of 430 megawatts, was selected for the sample study because it is in similar terrain to where the new plant is to be located.

North American officials said when a plane was sent to collect data, the pilot discovered dust-removing equipment had removed the plume, and he was unable to locate the area from which samples were to be taken.

UP&L officials asked for permission to shut down part of their pollution control equipment to make the plume visible, and the Division of Health agreed.
