Favorite Recipes

Vegetable Medley

2 slices bacon, cut fine
1 onion, diced
1 #2 can tomatoes
1 #2 can green beans

Cook broccoli in a small amount of water until tender. Drain, place in casserole. Mix soup and cheese and pour over broccoli. Melt butter and mix with crumbs. Sprinkle crumbs over all. Bake 30 minutes in a 350 degree oven. Serves 6.
