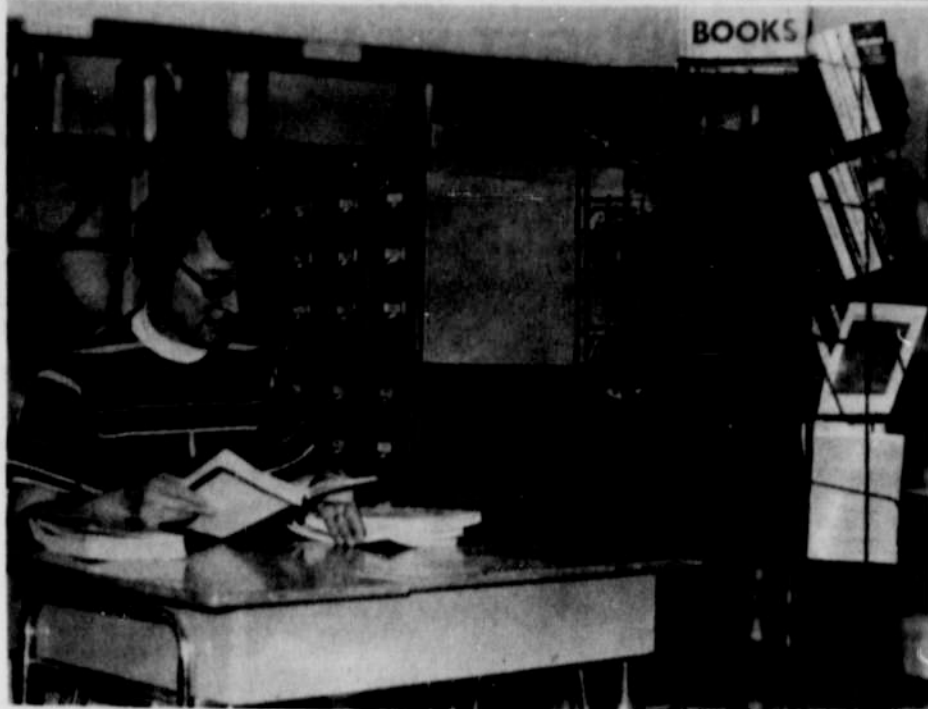

Psychology Offered At TVCC

A class in practical psychology designed for the person who wants to grasp some of the insights of modern psychology and apply them to ordinary living situations will be offered by Treasure Valley Community college during the winter quarter.

Practicum in Psychology will meet Thursday evenings from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m., in Room 21 of the Administration building beginning January 9. This community education three-credit, non-transfer class will be taught by C. M. Kirkpatrick.

The course will deal with abnormal psychology, motivation, emotion, and some aspects of social psychology. The text used is written in language that is understandable to the person who has no background in academic psychology. The main thrust of the course is to enable the student to better understand self-behavior and the behavior of others. The present term will include an overview of some of the modern theories used to explain abnormal or deviant behavior and a review of modern therapy methods.

An hour each evening will be devoted to the theory and practice of self-hypnosis. Those students who are interested will be taught the technique of self-hypnosis or self-relaxation and practical suggestions for its use will be given.

U of O Preview Set Scheduled February 8

What is it like at the University of Oregon? Prospective undergraduate students and their parents can find out at U of O Preview scheduled for Saturday, February 8.

Vernon Barkhurst, Director of Admissions, says the program is aimed at more than high school seniors. "We've outlined the day so that it will be interesting for any person who is interested in attending the University of Oregon whether they are high school or community college students."

The admissions director added that parents are encouraged to come to the campus along with prospective students.

Students who attend the day-long program will explore two academic fields in morning sessions and acquaint themselves with the University campus in three afternoon interest sessions. Parents may also choose two morning academic sessions and three afternoon special interest sessions.

The morning sessions will cover all schools and departments at the University, with a special session added for students who are undecided as to a major.

The afternoon program will include such topics as admissions, financial aid, university housing, music activities, club sports, and much more.

The deadline for registration for the program is February 3. Registration forms are available at high schools and community colleges in the area.

A fee of \$4.00 will be charged to cover registration and luncheon. For those not desiring lunch, the fee is \$2.00.

Prospective students will lunch with college students in the residence halls and parents will attend a catered lunch in the Erb Memorial Union. The program will run from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

First National Bank Reports 1974 Earnings

First National Bank of Oregon reported record high earnings for the year 1974, despite only a modest gain in the fourth quarter, reported Robert F. Wallace, president of the statewide financial institution.

The bank reported income before securities transactions of \$5,434,000, or \$1.02 per share, for the fourth quarter, up 6.1 percent from \$5,123,000, or 97 cents a share, a year earlier.

For 1974, income before securities transactions rose to a record \$21,366,000, a 16.3 percent gain from the prior year's \$18,370,000. Earnings amounted to \$4.02 per share compared with \$3.46 per share for 1973. Net income after securities transactions was \$20,972,000 or \$3.95 per share. This compares to \$18,086,000 or \$3.40 per share last year.

Despite strong commercial loan demand for much of 1974, First National's liquidity position enabled it to meet virtually all commercial loan requests from established bank customers, Wallace said.

Mortgages continued to be an active First National lending area. During the year, the bank continued its role as the largest private lender of funds for housing in Oregon, a period of scarce mortgage funds locally and nationally.

Wallace explained that First National's improved earnings reflected record high interest rates, strong gains in trust division fees and international banking transactions, higher earnings from federal funds transactions, and increased rent from leased space in First National Bank Tower.

First National continues to experience favorably low net loan losses, with 1974's total of \$1.7 million the lowest for the bank in the last six years. The portion of the bank's reserve for loan losses which is available to absorb charge-offs was increased \$784,000 to a total of \$15.4 million, using the minimum provision required by regulatory authorities, the president explained.

Loan totals at the end of the year were \$1,441,689,000 up \$45,033,000 or 3.2 percent from the \$1,396,656,000 reported on Dec. 31, 1973.

Deposits at year-end totaled \$2,178,444,000 compared with \$2,230,743,000 reported at the close of business in 1973, a decline of \$52,299,000 or 2.3 percent.

The Nyssa branch reported deposits of \$14,491,065 and loans of \$7,935,882 as of Dec. 31. Comparable totals for the branch a year ago were \$14,300,320 in deposits and \$6,950,014 in loans.

Tony Yturri Elected To U.S. Bank Board

Anthony Yturri, Ontario attorney, has been elected to the boards of directors of U. S. Bancorp and United States National Bank of Oregon.

Yturri served in the Oregon state senate from 1957 to 1973. He was senate minority leader for two sessions, and during his 16-year service was chairman of most senate committees.

He served four years in the U. S. Army Counterintelligence Corps and Judge Advocate General's Department, rising to the rank of captain.

He is a director of Cascade Natural Gas Corporation and Equitable Savings and Loan

Association. He served as president of the Western Conference of the Council of State Governments, and from 1967 to 1973 was chairman of the Oregon Criminal Law Revision Commission.

Yturri was born in Jordan Valley, Oregon, and was graduated from the University of Oregon Law School in 1937 as a doctor of jurisprudence. He is now a member of the legal firm of Yturri, O'Kief, Rose and Burnham.

Sewing With Wool Classes

Sewing with wool often provides the experienced home sewer the ultimate in home sewing success, states Carol Knothe, Malheur County Extension Home Economist. The experienced home seamstress has the opportunity to participate in the three-part wool demonstration workshop beginning Monday, January 20, 7:30, Treasure Valley Community College, Room C-22. The professional look in sewing with wool will be highlighted during lesson one. Selection and preparation of wool, linings and interfacing and pressing techniques will be included.

Charles Dean, Fruitland, will give a demonstration on spinning of wool the first evening of the workshop. Mr. Dean has given his presentation to several groups and 4-H clubs in the area, as well as at the Western Idaho State Fair.

Wool sewing basics including sleeves, hems, and buttonholes are to be featured in session 2 and 3, January 27 and February 3.

The pre-registration is required. Extension programs are open to all, regardless of race, color, or creed.

Dealers Go Back To School

Approximately 400 members of the Intermountain Association of Hardware and Implement Dealers, will go back to school when they attend the Annual Association Convention in Boise, from February 9 to 11.

The school in management training will have as faculty members Dr. Don R. Webb of the University of Missouri, Dr. James R. G. Olson, Dean of the School of Business and Industrial Management at Millikin University, Decatur, Illinois, and Godfrey Parson, President of the Research Division of MNO Programs International, Inc., which is conducting the school for the association.

"We have our own problems too, as middlemen between suppliers and farmers and believe the school which has been arranged during the Boise convention, will help improve our management and service to the trade."

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
