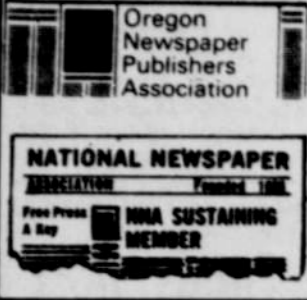

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PRINCIPLES FOR AN ENERGY POLICY

One of the first orders of business of the new Congress should be the development of a national energy policy.

Given the current economic situation, the balance of payments deficit resulting from over-reliance on foreign sources of petroleum must not continue, yet a "no-growth" course is just as clearly undesirable. So, the primary aim of any energy plan should be to increase our domestic supplies coupled with a strong program of voluntary energy conservation.

Such a program must take into account industry's problems of capital formation and the shortages of materials and equipment.

The Congress and the President must be prepared to legislate tax policies which will attract capital and manpower to energy industries and which will remove regulatory impediments to production and distribution of energy supplies.

Long-range planning and accelerated research by both government and the private sector should extend to the area of nuclear energy.

Public lands, including the outer continental shelf, should be opened to development. Oil and gas prices need to be de-controlled and our air and water quality standards need to be reasonable and practical.

Finally, it is time to incorporate all those agencies dealing piecemeal with aspects of pollution control, water and land use planning, and natural resources planning and development, into a new federal department.

There is much to be done in the area of energy, and expectant Americans are watching to see if the new Congress and the President are prepared to do what is necessary.
