In comparison with last year, practically every commodity is bringing more

money. Butterfat a year ago was bringing 20 cents; the past week it has been quoted up to 37 cents. Eggs a year ago were bringing 11 cents, this week buyers in local stores have been paying 20 cents. Wheat a year ago was 55 cents a bushel; now it is 65 cents.

Due to the mild weather and quarantine restrictions, the hay growers have not fared so well. Hay at the present time is being sold at from \$6.60 to \$7.00.
