YCC Program For Students

Over 10,000 application forms for the 1975 YCC program have been mailed to Oregon junior and senior high schools and to state employment offices, state recruiter Tom Sullivan announced today.

Oregon youth between the ages of 15 and 18 are eligible for employment in the federally funded program.

YCC will provide some 200 jobs in national forests and other public lands in Oregon in a program of conservation employment and environmental education. Hiring will be based on a random drawing from all applications.

Persons wishing to apply for YCC should contact their school principal or counselor or the local State Employment office for application forms.

Veterans Loans

The Department of Veterans' Affairs granted 14,116 loans in 1974 in the amount of \$304,354,822 for the highest year on record, H. C. Saalfeld, director, reported today. This was 25 percent over the number of loans in the previous record year, 1973, and 35 percent above the 1973 dollar volume, also the previous high.

Saalfeld said last year's volume represents 56 loans for \$1.2 million every working day. The monthly volume was 1,176 loans for \$25.3 million.

In Malheur County last year, loans went to 74 veterans in the amount of \$1,751,002, compared with 72 loans in 1973 for \$1,545,927.

Since the loan program started in 1945, loans have gone to 1068 veterans in this county in the amount of \$15,196,459. Statewide, 120,745 loans have been granted for \$1,665,281,586.

Saalfeld said loan applications last year set a new record also, totaling 16,547 or 23 percent above the previous record set in 1973.

Net earnings from the program last year amounted to \$6,433,653 for the highest year on record and nearly \$4.6 million above 1973. It brings over-all earnings since 1945 to \$33,500,884.
