10 YEARS AGO

Nyssa High School "Quiz Kids" emerged victorious last Thursday afternoon in a television battle against four students from the high school at New Plymouth, Idaho. The local winning team was comprised of Kathy Farmer, Judy Nedry, Victor Haburchak and Greg Sumner. They walked off with 230-140 win and earned \$10

for their school library. Alternates were Nadine Spitze and Linda Morrison.

The boys who qualified for the FFA State Farmer degree, are Terry Oft, Steven Jensen, Van and Vaughn Schulthies.

Voters of Adrian School District No. 61 approved the issuance of \$135,000 school bonds in an election Monday Feb. 8. With about 40

percent of those eligible to vote going to the polls the count was 236 "Yes" to 96 "No". The money will be used primarily for a multi-purpose building, new heating plant and equipment for the cafeteria.

20 YEARS AGO

Residents of the Nyssa area have contributed \$3,085.06 to the 1955 March of Dimes through various methods of fund-raising, according to Rex Voelker, Nyssa chairman.

During December, January and the first week of February, a total of 16 inches of snow fell in the immediate Nyssa area. A large part of the snowfall has turned into packed snow or ice and has presented a few problems. Even old timers are confused about this winter's

weather conditions that have brought an over-abundance of snow in the valley and weather observer reports of a below normal supply of snow in the higher hills that provide irrigation water.

30 YEARS AGO

E.K. Burton, former employe of the state highway department, has been appointed city manager of Nyssa and will take office February 15. The new city manager, who is married and has two sons in the service, "brings

to Nyssa a wealth of experience, practical and technical, in civic and municipal affairs and is very well liked by all persons who have dealt with him," city officials say.

Machinery for certifying GI farm loan guarantees through the Malheur County Veteran's loan committee has been set up and the committee is ready to review applications of discharged veterans who wish to use the GI loan guarantee provisions of the veterans' administration is establishing them-

selves on farms in this area, announced David Mitchell of Nyssa, chairman of the committee.

40 YEARS AGO

Another settler arrived Sunday on the new project southwest of Nyssa and started arranging for living quarters preparatory to clearing the land. The new arrival was J.R. Ashby and family of Garland, Utah, who have 160 acres a mile west of the highway seven miles out of Adrian. One of the Garland boys is bringing a

rubber-tired tractor through from Utah for use in clearing the land.

Frank and Bill Ury of Wendall and families have moved to this section and will farm between Nyssa and Ontario. They arrived Monday morning but were called back to Wendall Wednesday evening by word of the death of their father. They expect to return in a few days to make their permanent home here.

Favorite Recipes



Cherry pie, cherry cobbler and cherry torte are all popular desserts for February, for Valentine's Day and commemorating our first president's birthday.

Tortes are easy and tender—if you beat them long enough—at least 5 minutes. This one is bound to please your taste buds.

Apple torte is nice and moist. A blender solves the chore of chopping apples. Simply core the apples and cut them in fourths. Fill blender 3/4 full of water and drop in two apples. Turn to medium speed and turn off almost immediately. Pour apples and water into a strainer and presto—they're

Cherry Torte

3 egg whites
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup sugar
1/4 cup chopped walnuts
1/2 cup finely crushed saltine crackers
1 tsp. baking powder
Filling:
2 1/2 cups pitted tart red cherries
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 tsp. almond extract
2 tbsps. cornstarch
1 cup whipped topping
Beat egg whites and vanilla until foamy. Gradually add the 1 cup sugar, beating to stiff peaks. (at least 3 minutes) mix together nuts, cracker crumbs and baking powder; fold in egg whites carefully. Spread in well-greased 9-inch pie pan, building up sides. Bake in 300 degree oven about 40 minutes or until dry on outside. Cool.

Drain cherries, reserve syrup. In saucepan, combine 3/4 cup of the syrup, the remaining sugar and almond extract, heat to boiling. Add cherries, cook 5 minutes. Combine cornstarch and remaining syrup. Add to hot mixture in saucepan. Cook and stir till thickened and bubbly. Cool. Whip cream. Line Meringue shell with half of the whipped cream. Fill with cooled cherry mixture; top with remaining whipped cream. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Apple Torte

1/4 cup butter
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1 cup flour
1 tsp. soda
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. nutmeg
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
2 cups chopped apples
Cream the butter, add sugar and beat until fluffy. Add egg and beat until blended. Sift flour with soda, salt, nutmeg, and cinnamon. Add to creamed mixture alternately with the apples. Pour into an 8" x 8" x 2" aluminum pan. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 30 to 35 minutes. Serves 9.
And then the following sauce makes it even better!!
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup white sugar
3/4 tsp. vanilla.
Combine butter, sugar and cream, mix thoroughly and heat on medium heat, blend well. Add vanilla and serve warm over Apple Torte.
