



Cheese Oven Omelettes Easy Answer for Brunch

Brunch entertaining is an easy and leisurely way to serve simple, wholesome breakfast foods in a more glamorous way. Versatile cheese is a delightful companion to the ubiquitous egg and the variations of two are seemingly endless. Hot buttered muffins, glazed fruit and milk go along with ham'n cheese omelettes.

Baked Cheese Omelettes
 1/4 cup butter
 1 cup finely diced cooked ham (about 1/4 pound)
 6 eggs
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon rubbed sage
 1/4 teaspoon thyme

1/4 tsp. tarragon, crushed
 1/4 cup flour
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 1 cup small curd cottage cheese
 1/2 pound cheddar cheese, grated (2 cups)

Melt butter in skillet. Spoon 1 teaspoon into each of 4 individual baking dishes (3/4 to 1 cup each). Coat dishes with butter. Add ham to remaining butter. Saute about five minutes. Beat eggs with salt, pepper seasoning, sage, thyme, tarragon, flour and baking powder. Mix in cheeses and ham. Spoon into baking dishes, distributing ham as evenly as possible. Bake in 400 deg. oven 15 minutes. Reduce heat to 325 deg. and bake 15 minutes longer or until puffed and golden. Makes 4 servings.
