Recipes Cornmeal Dish

Imagine something tasting halfway between cornbread and a cheese souffle and you'll get the idea of how delicious this oven dish is going to taste. It comes out with a pretty golden puffed crown which sinks fast as souffles are wont to do. For a main course accompany it with corned beef or ham, a hot green vegetable and cole

Cornmeal Cheese Puff

11/4 cups milk 1/2 cup cornmeal

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon marjoram

1/4 teaspoon dill weed 1/4 teaspoon baking powder

2 eggs, separated

% cup grated cheddar cheese Butter Grated parmesan cheese

Heat 1/4 cup milk in saucepan until scalded. Mix cornmeal, salt, marjoram, sage and remaining 1/2 cup milk. Stir into hot milk and cook, stirring, until mixture comes to boil. Let it bubble gently 1 minute, stirring all the while. Mix in egg yolks. Mix in baking powder. cheddar cheese and 2 tablespoons butter, stirring until butter is melted. Whip egg whites until stiff. Fold into cornmeal mixture. Turn into buttered 1-quart baking dish. Bake in 375 deg. oven 30 to 35 minutes or until puffed and golden brown. Serve promptly (before it falls) with butter and grated parmesan cheese on top. Makes 4
