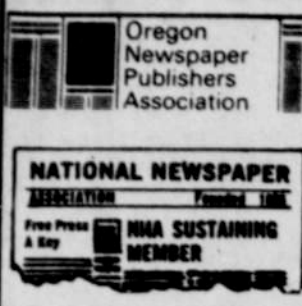

Edwin E. Crocker

Services for Edwin Earl Crocker, 84, Nyssa, who died Wednesday, March 26, 1975, at a Boise hospital, were conducted Saturday at the Lienkaemper Chapel, Nyssa. Interment was at the Nyssa Cemetery. Services were under the direction of the Masonic Lodge, No. 147, AF&AM, Nyssa.

He was born September 21, 1890 in Pittsburg, Kansas. He homesteaded in Baca County, Colorado in 1916, later working in the steel mills at Pueblo, Colorado and farming. Mr. Crocker moved to the Nyssa area in 1934, where he farmed until his retirement and then he moved to Ontario. He was an active member of the Golden Rule Lodge No. 147, Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Nyssa, a member of Al Kader Shrine of Portland and served many years on the Advisory Council of the DeMolay, Owyhee Chapter, Ontario. Earl spent many hours each year collecting for the Annual Shrine Auction which benefited the Shriner's Crippled Childrens Hospital in Portland and Salt Lake. His work with DeMolay has been appreciated by many young men who had the opportunity to work with him. For many years he served as a member of the School Board for the Adrian School District.

Surviving are a son, Melvin of Nyssa; five daughters, Mrs. Veda Riley and Nadine Patton, both of Quincy, Wash.; Mrs. Louise Moore of Notus; Mrs. Joan Knowles of Oakridge, Oregon; and Mrs. Jean Fenn of Ontario; 16 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. One brother, Ted of Pawnee, Oklahoma; three sisters, Edith and Effie of Pawnee and Mrs. Hann of California. His wife, Lillie Mae, preceded him in death on September 3, 1971 and a son Leslie passed away in 1944.

The family suggests memorials to the Shriner's Crippled Childrens Hospital in Portland.

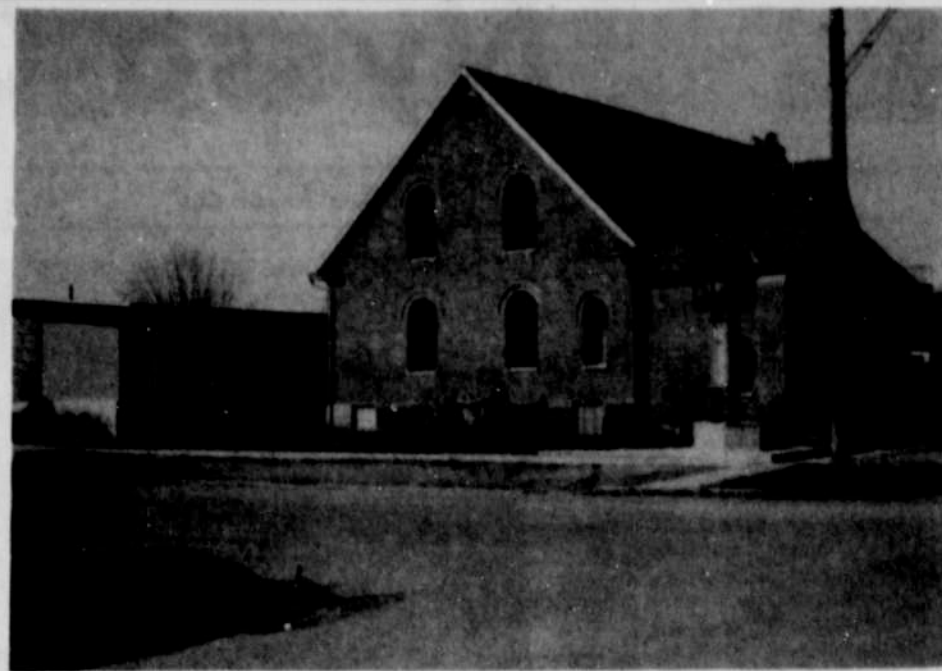

Human Dignity, Inspirational Music World Conference Broadcasts Stress

The eternal dignity of women and men—and teachings to help them withstand hardship, disappointment and temptations—will be in the spotlight during the 145th Annual General Conference of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, April 4, 5 and 6.

The conference will convene in the world-famed Salt Lake Mormon Tabernacle on Temple Square in Salt Lake City, world headquarters for 3.5 million Mormons, as members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints are commonly identified.

Thousands of Church members and friends will attend sessions of the conference, but millions of other around the globe will be able to

witness proceedings via World Conference Broadcasts.

President Spencer W. Kimball, world leader of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, will direct the conference and deliver the keynote address. Other general officers of the Church will also speak.

The 375-voice Salt Lake Mormon Tabernacle Choir, known worldwide for its tours, record albums and weekly radio and television program, will provide music for the conference and broadcasts.

The temple, serving more than 300,000 Church members in the eastern United States and Canada, symbolizes the Church's growth and emphasizes some of its central teachings.
