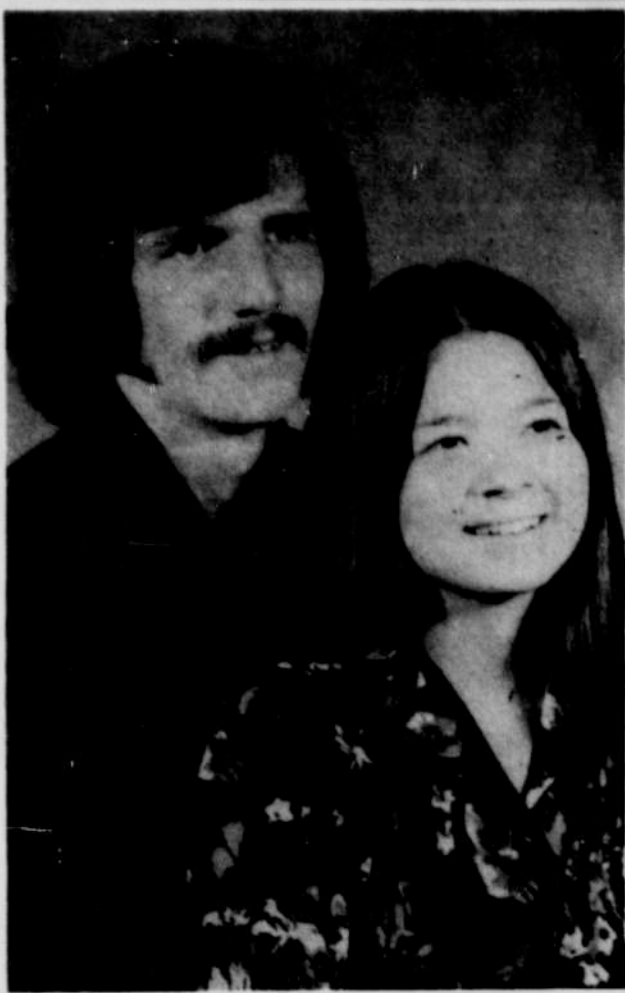




Engagement Announced

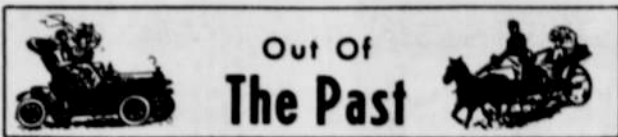
Joan Henigson Initiated Into Phi Delta Kappa

Phi Delta Kappa is an international, professional fraternity for men and women in education. The fraternity has over 90,000 members in 420 chapters located in five countries. The organization's purpose is to promote high quality, publicly supported education.

Pi Chapter is the 16th oldest chapter of Phi Delta Kappa, and has recently been selected as the outstanding chapter in the area of research in competition with the 30 chapters of PDK

comprising District 5. Pi chapter's criteria for admission of candidates are: a 4.5 cumulative grade point average (A-S.O) and enrollment in a graduate program in education, or nomination for leadership in public education at the elementary, secondary, or university level. Candidates are elected by vote of the membership.

The Malheur Memorial Hospital at Nyssa completed in October of 1950 has been serving the people of the area for almost five years. The completely modern 44-bed institution has a staff of seven local doctors and a consulting staff of about 15 specialists. Over \$360,000 was raised by community subscription from over 2,000 donors toward the building of

the hospital. This hospital gained fame throughout the northwest during a polio epidemic in 1952 by treating 78 different cases of polio and having as many as 26 patients in the special ward at one time. New equipment has been added to make this hospital one of the best equipped of its kind in the Northwest.

The future of biking

In 1973, there were more bicycles sold than new automobiles. This is very impressive when you consider the long-term love affair Americans have carried on with cars. Perhaps some of this affection is now being diverted to a new love — the bicycle.

It is doubtful that the bike will ever replace the family car as a means of transportation, but the bike is certainly assuming a new importance as a form of recreation.

Important attributes of a bicycle are weight and strength. The frame, especially, should be strong and rigid to sustain the road shock and weight of the rider.

Mossberg has recently introduced competition racing bicycles which use Magnamite graphite material for the frame. The frame weighs a mere 3.10 pounds, yet is incredibly strong and stiff. The raw material is expensive, however, so its use is confined to custom, professional racing bikes at present.

The development of Mossberg's Race-Lite Magnamite graphite bicycle is the result of their recognition of the bicycle as a "recreational vehicle" rather than a child's toy. Their efforts in research and development are aimed at making the bicycle safer, stronger and, most of all, fun to ride.
