### HOW GOLF STARTED

Scotland is known as the home of golf, and the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews controls the rules under which the game is played throughout the world. Yet, Teacher's Scotch Information Centre blushes to admit, golf is not really a Scottish game at all.



Hitting a ball about goes back as a pastime into the mists of time. But the theory of how the game came to

Scotland and was developed there goes back a few hundred years to the days when there was a thriving trade between Scotland and Holland.

Small Dutch boats would cross the North Sea bringing all manners of goods, but particularly spirits, to Scotland. The little town of St. Andrews was a favourite landfall and Dutch skippers would bring their barques up on the beach there.

After the ship was unloaded and there was time for skipper and crew to rest and refresh themselves, the Dutchmen would play a game they called "kolf." This consisted of picking up a suitable pebble from the beach and hitting it with a stick across sand and grass towards the nearest hostelry.

The man who took the fewest hits was judged the winner and the others had to buy him drinks. The Scots who saw the Dutchmen play this rudimentary game took it up as well and transformed "kolf" into the golf we know today.

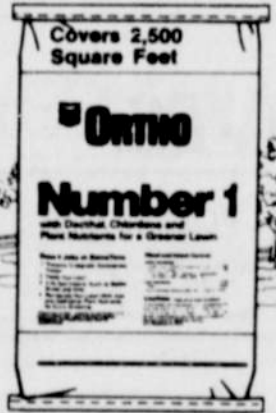
