



Out of The Past

10 YEARS AGO

Superintendent W. L. McPartland announced today that enrollment has jumped from 1285 to 1426 students since December in the Nyssa schools. This is an increase of 141 youngsters. All except four or five have come in since March and are children of migrant workers. Most of the increase is at the primary level with 64 new pupils in the first three grades. The elementary school had an influx of 60 new children in two days.

Superintendent McPartland said that it is necessary to provide books, desks and supplies for the maximum number of children enrolled during the year, and indications are that the enrollment will grow to at least 1450 students.

Many of the children enrolling in the lower grades speak little or no English. What can a teacher with a full classroom of regular enrollees do to give very much help to the newcomers? What happens to the regular children if enough time is given to meet the individual needs of the new pupils?

Mrs. Dorothy Wilson worked with students who needed help in learning English last fall and is again working with these children. There are plans to provide a program under the new Economic Opportunity Act. This program will be financed entirely with federal funds.

20 YEARS AGO

Actual installation of a new collector for Nyssa's domestic and irrigation water got underway Monday when the Ranney corporation's six-man crew started sinking a large caisson for the various feeder lines. The well's production of not less than one million gallons per day is guaranteed.

According to City Manager Robert Applegate, plans have been drawn for a pumping station and various equipment, installation of various sizes of transmission pipe and other facilities.

Nyssa voters approved a \$183,000 bond issue for the new water system by a vote of 191 to 4 on March 28.

Mrs. Boyd Shaw has received a Purple Heart Medal from the government as a posthumous award for her husband, Boyd Shaw, who was killed in action March 4.
