In a surprise move, the Oregon State Board of Health Wednesday gave the green light to Nyssa for the administration of the Salk Polio vaccine to school children of the first and second grades.

The vaccine to be used here is from the Parke Davis Laboratories, and has been given exhaustive safety checks by the U. S. Public Health Service scientific teams. Parents of about 400 children in this area, 302 in Nyssa proper, had originally signed applications for inoculation of their tots.
